

## Frank Cavanaugh, American Hero, Portrayed in New O'Brien Film

Quite a man was the late Major Frank Cavanaugh, whom Pat O'Brien portrays in "The Iron Major," his newest picture coming to the Arcade Theatre February 13th.

The star discovered that fact when he went to New England, before starting the film, to talk to people who knew "Cav." Everyone agreed that he was an outstanding coach and a regular guy.

One of the men who knew him best was Ernest La Branche, silver-haired newspaperman on the Worcester, Mass., "Telegram." La Branche was brought to Hollywood by Producer Robert Fellows to act as technical advisor on the World War I scenes which form an important sequence in the story. La Branche served as a corporal under the Iron Major and was one of the men who helped to carry him off the battlefield at Verdun when Cav was wounded under fire.

"I helped get him on a field stretcher. It took six of us to carry him, he was such a big man. Cav never lost consciousness or cried out. And when they started to help him at the dressing station he wanted them to help the younger fellows first."

It was incidents such as this plus the fact that Cavanaugh enlisted at 41, when he was married and the father of six, which gave him the nickname of "The Iron

Major." Today he has six sons and one daughter serving Uncle Sam. The Cavanaugh strain stands up!

Another reason for Frank Cavanaugh's greatness was his love for humanity. That, too, made him a great football coach, according to "Hiker" Joy, his assistant for 14 years, who was brought to Hollywood to help reproduce the football scenes.

"He loved young people," explained Joy. "He wanted to help them. He'd work with them. That is what made him a great football coach and a great leader of soldiers. But he wanted to put starch in their backbones. He was a great disciplinarian, and he hated a mollycoddle."

### Trouble Brewing for Punch Board Men

Trouble may be brewing for punch board operators over town. At the city council meeting Monday evening, councilmen investigated the situation at the request of Mayor S. L. Mackin and H. W. Lombard city attorney gave his opinion that the punch boards would come under the gambling laws of both the city and state and were therefore in violation of the law. The council will consider the matter further at the next council meeting.

### ROUND-UP

WFA says dairy payments at present rates will be continued up to February 17, and beyond that they will depend upon Congressional action. Cider vinegar will cost approximately three cents a quart more at retail—A 20 per cent increase.

Under a new OPA regulation to compensate processors and packers for increased raw material costs. Local rationing boards may now issue an interim coupon sheet enabling a consumer to buy fuel oil while OPA investigates the loss or theft of his ration sheet.

Retail prices increases per pound of three cents for sea scallops, five cents for lemon sole round, and 16 cents for lemon sole fillet are expected as a result of wholesale price increases allowed by OPA.

Manufacture of 400,000 aluminum pressure canners, one size holding seven one-quart glass jars, and another size holding 14 one-quart jars, has been authorized by WPB provided there is no interference with munitions manufacture.

To increase horse collar production, WPB has issued special instructions to manufacturers to bring about the increase.

Civilians will get slightly more edible fats and oils per person than they had on the average in 1935-39, according to WFA. They will get slightly less butter however. OPA predicts a larger supply of lower-priced rayon knit garments and lower prices for or better quality in such garments.

### Use Feathers

Feathers from chicken-dressing plants were formerly wasted or used as fertilizer. Now they are being preserved in a weak acid solution and will be used for sleeping bags, pillows, and for camouflage.

### SAFETY CODE READY

Copies of the first drafts of a revision of the state logging safety code and the sawmilling and woodworking codes have been completed by the accident prevention division of the state industrial accident commission and are now ready for distribution, upon application, to operators, employees and organizations for study.

The codes define the legal requirements of the different phases of operations of these industries, which pertain to the safety of the employees while working.

Requests for copies of the revised codes should be made direct to the accident prevention division at Salem. Public hearings on the codes will be held at a later date at several points in the state in accordance with the legal requirements governing hearings.

### MORE COFFEE, COCOA in 1944

Civilians will get more coffee, chocolate, and cocoa in 1944 than in 1943, according to the War Food administration. Four pounds more of coffee and one-half pound more of cocoa beans have been allocated for each civilian.

### BITS O' BUSINESS

Cancellation of General Electric's war contracts in 1943 amounted to \$450 millions, but it had a year's production in unfilled orders at the beginning of 1944. General Motors is ready to make 1942 model cars as soon as the signal comes, perhaps before the end of the year, but they won't sell for \$400; they'll run

about 20 per cent higher than pre-war prices. Harry Winston, New York diamond merchant, cut the 153-carat Liberator diamond, worth \$200,000, into three pieces, which are now worth a total of \$275,000 at wholesale.

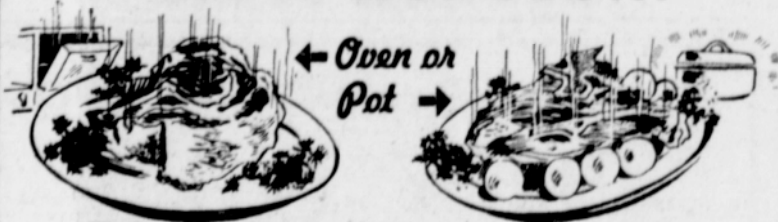
