SIDEWALKS NEGLECTED

Many patrons now receiving mail on city carrier routes have not kept their walks in condition good enough to continue receiving their mail by carrier.

A survey is being made on all routes, therefore if your walks have missing, loose, or broken boards better have them repaired or I will be compelled to discontinue service on orders from the post office department. This also applies to cement walks which are broken to the extent they may cause a carrier to stumble and fall, and walks that have been upheaved by trees to a sloping position causing carriers to slip and become injured in many ways.

Many citizens do not keep their walks free from leaves, mud, weeds, briars, etc., all of which will be taken into consideration when service is discontinued.

Discontinued service means you will be obliged to call at the post office for your mail whenever walks are found unsafe for your carrier.

Hoping immediate steps will be taken to improve condition of your walks so that such action will not be necessary.
