

Co. Court Submits Three Mill Levy In May Primaries

The Lane county commissioner's court Saturday filed an order providing for the submission to voters in the May primaries a three mill levy which would provide a post war fund for the erection of a new court house at Eugene and a fund for the construction of roads and bridges and for the repair of same. A tax levy of one mill would be paid for the next five years; the funds to go for the construction of a new court house. The road and bridge levy would be two mills over the same period. The proposal is a part of the post war program to furnish employment for the returning veterans and others.

The court house fund would raise \$249,941.40 the building to be erected either by the county alone or in conjunction with the city of Eugene to be used by both the county and the city of Eugene. The proposed road levy would provide a fund of \$495,882.80 over the five year period. At least two new bridges would be provided in the road and bridge fund, it is understood. One known as the Ferry street bridge over the Willamette in Eugene and the other over Row river on the Disston road east of here. The full road program as proposed by the court has never been announced so far as known and it is not known whether such a program contemplates the construction of a new bridge over the Coast Fork in the city of Cottage Grove.

RESCUE BY SUN

Months ago, Captain Eddie Rickenbacker, adrift at sea, hit on the idea of using a mirror to catch the sun's rays and flash them into the eyes of distant plane pilots. Now our fighting men, when they embark on the high seas, are equipped with mirrors for emergency signalling. The 4x5-inch mirrors are being made in volume by the General Electric Company.

An official of Libbey-Owens-Ford Glass company, which makes glass used in such mirrors, tells me that the accuracy is assured by two innovations in mirror making. First, a specially heat-treated glass is used which can't be bent out of true in handling, storage or use. This is essential since even a slight warping of the surface would seriously affect aiming efficiency. Secondly, a cross-shaped aperture in the mirror's center makes it possible to aim it as accurately as an automatic Garand rifle. Under reasonably good conditions, the mirror will "shoot" a strong beam of sunlight and hit a target up to ten miles away.

It's worth has often been proven: for example, a sailor adrift off Florida recently was rescued after signalling to a blimp six miles away.

1944 PLAN SHEET VITAL TO FARM WAR PROGRAM

The importance of every Oregon farmer working out a farm plan for his 1944 operations is stressed by William J. Enschede of Hillsboro, member of state AAA committee. The sign-up is currently being conducted by county committees through meetings, community committeemen, mails and county office contacts, and county office contacts.

"Working out a plan sheet," Enschede points out, "gives each farmer an opportunity to line up his production with war food needs. Similarly, the production intentions reported by farmers are needed to determine probable supplies." He added that making out a farm plan is required for participation in the 1944 AAA program, and provides for payments for performing production-boosting soil building and conserving practices.
