PRICE-MONAHAN CEREMONY HELD FEBRUARY 20th

Dr. S. R. Huntington read the ceremony in the presence of about 70 relatives and friends. The altar bore a cauldron adding lighted white tapers on either side of a basket of white carnations, daffodils and yellow snapdragons. Baskets of the same flowers stood at the entrance to the chancel. Miss Prudence Patterson played the wedding marches and accompanied William Lawrence, who sang before the ceremony.
