AT IT AGAIN

People continue to throw garbage along the highways rather than taking the trouble to drive to the dump grounds. PAPER SALVAGE

The increasing shortage of books, magazines, newspapers and other things made of paper isn't so much due to the actual shortage of paper as help. Hundreds of tons of waste paper has been shipped to the mills, in fact they have been deluged with it, so much so that cars have been tied up. The committee is having trouble disposing of waste paper in Eugene, we have been told and for this reason may not get around to collecting paper here.

More waste paper will be needed shortly, however if the mills are to keep going. The main problem is to create an even flow of paper to the mills.

EVERY CITIZEN A POLITICIAN

The reason so few of the earth's people govern themselves is that they don't want to.

Millions in American cities submit to the tyranny of corrupt machines. They find it easier to let the machine politicians govern than to take the trouble to fight for a decent city.

Self government is not easy, anywhere, unless people will work at it.

It is surprising what a little determined, well directed effort will accomplish. The time to start is always early, before the professionals get too far. They are always forehanded.

Good government in township, village and county is the first step toward better government in state and nation. Our country will reach its best state when the best citizens in every unit take time to work at the job of citizenship.

Politics is nothing more than the management of the people's public affairs. If every citizen took it upon himself to be a politician, this would actually be a self-governing country.

Perhaps you have heard of Congressman W Hatten Summers of Texas efforts to have a constitutional amendment which would do away with the required two thirds majority of congress to pass a bill over the presidents veto. Mr. Summers would make it a majority rather than the two-thirds and quotes figures to show that from the time of the first president George Washington until the time of A. Lincoln, presidents used the veto power only fifty two times. During the twelve years President Roosevelt has been in office he has used the veto 600 times.

NEW CEILINGS ON VARIOUS ITEMS

The Office of Price Administration recently established price ceilings on several items. For consumers, a reduction on Virginia type dried pork products—5 to 6 cents a pound on whole or half hams; 6 to 7 cents a pound on sliced ham; 4 to 5 cents on bacon; 3 to 4 cents on sides; 2 cents on jowls, and 5 cents on shoulders. New ceilings on goat meat represent moderate reduction set by geographic zones. Highest priced goat meat under the new order is "Cabrito" which sells for 30 cents a pound at retail. Soybeans of the 1943 crop to be processed for oil are \$1.86 a bushel for base grade and \$1.92 a bushel for highest quality. Prices for the 1943 fruit and vegetable pack will apply to this year's pack until a 1944 price is set. Yellow cypress lumber was increased \$3 to \$4 per 1,000 board feet for producers—to be passed on to consumers. A 20-cent-per-pound producers' ceiling was set on all round Chinook salmon and 24 cents on drawn Chinook, on catches in California, Oregon, and Washington (Except Sacramento River catch, effective through March.

Best Marksmen Right-Eyed

Men with dominant right eyes are the best marksmen, it is said. Studies of nearly 2,000 military recruits showed that men with very strong right eyes made the best showing, and that the poorest shots were those whose left eyes were highly predominant. However, the poor showing of left-eyed men probably partly was the result of the fact that the rifles were designed for right-handed persons. Only 16 per cent of the right-handed men were left-eyed.

Absentees High

That sickness, inefficiency, swamped communities and hardship must be reckoned as a cost of breaking ship tonnage records appears from the absentee record for the first nine months of 1943. An Emergency Fleet corporation study of 320,000 shipworkers showed that 17.8 per cent in steel shipyards and 13.2 per cent in wooden shipyards stayed away from work every day over that period.

Farm Land Boom Still Threat as Prices Increase

Current developments in the extremely diverse conditions in various sections of the country, with the general trend sharply upward, especially in the east, south, central and Pacific regions, according to an analysis by the agricultural economics section of the O. S. C. extension service.

On November 1, 1943, farm land prices had reached 141 per cent of the 1912-14 level in the Pacific group, compared with 105 per cent in the country as a whole. By groups, land prices ranged from 79 per cent of the 1912-14 average in the west north central states to 147 in the east south central, according to USDA bureau of agricultural economics figures.

Sales of farms continued to increase in Oregon generally last year and reached a record number, exceeding even the 1919-20 boom. Current indications point to danger of seriously inflated farm real estate activity in 1944, with increasing farm mortgage indebtedness, despite substantial investments in war bonds and debt retirement by many farm families.

The average rise in land prices in the whole country in 1943 was about 13 per cent, the highest increase in rate since the boom year 1919-20. Land prices per acre last November were 44 per cent above the low point in 1933 but still 38 per cent under the 1920 boom peak.

The sharp drop in land prices from 1920 to 1935 was associated with much reduced net cash income from farming operations, due largely to disparity between prices for farm products and the cost of farming. Net cash farm income, including that from non-farm sources, fell from 9.2 billion dollars in 1919, the year after World War I ended, to 6.8 billion in 1920 and 3.6 billion in 1921.

Current figures on the trend of farm prices and costs in Oregon prepared by L. R. Breithaupt, extension agricultural economist, indicate some reversal in the ratio during 1943. The Oregon index of the general level of prices of farm products advanced only 4 per cent while costs, including labor, went up two or three times as much during the year.

3RD ARMY-NAVY TEST

The third army-navy qualifying test for the army specialized training program and the navy college program V-12 which will be given throughout the country on Wednesday, March 15, at 9:00 a. m., will be administered at the Cottage Grove Union high school, F. L. Grannis, principal announced Monday.

A leaflet of general information which contains an admission-identification form may be obtained at the office of the high school principal. This form properly filled out will admit to the test students between the ages of 17 and 21 inclusive who are high school graduates or who will be graduated by July 1, 1944. Intent to take the test should be made known immediately to F. L. Grannis, care of Union High School in order that the necessary test supplies may be ordered.

The army specialized training program is aimed to meet the army's needs for specialists and technicians in certain critical fields of study. Academic work is at the college level at government expense.

The navy college program also enables students to continue academic training at government expense. Successful completion of

PETE THE ICEMAN

Today any spot on the globe is less than 60 hours flying time from your home airport. When the war ends, many new devices and vastly improved existing ones will be ready to help commercial and private aviation cut off additional time.

One of these, just revealed, is "Pete, The Iceman," a new electronic de-icer control developed by the B. F. Goodrich company and Bendix Aviation corporation. The new control, company engineers said, gives pilots accurate and instantly variable control in combatting every type of ice formation and also applies 50 per cent greater force.

Using the rubber "boots" developed by B. F. Goodrich and now standard winter equipment on commercial and military aircraft, the pilot operates an electronic timer which gives a more selective method of inflating and deflating the pulsating rubber in breaking the ice. By means of push buttons, the pilot can speed up or slow down the pulsations in any wing or tail section while only momentarily interrupting the automatic operating of the regular de-icing system.

Farmers' Share

The farmer's share of the consumer's dollar spent for a group of specified foods is near the record high levels of World War I, having reached 57 cents in February, and March, but dropping to 56 cents in April, 1943.

Milk in a Cube

There's a chance you will buy a week's supply of fresh milk at the grocery store one of these days in a package of milk cubes. Now being experimented with, the cubes are dry, wrapped, and can be kept several weeks in a refrigerator.
