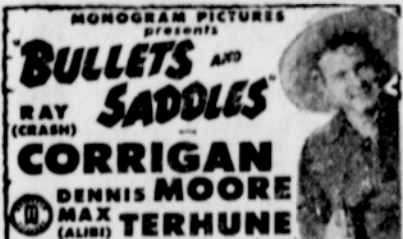

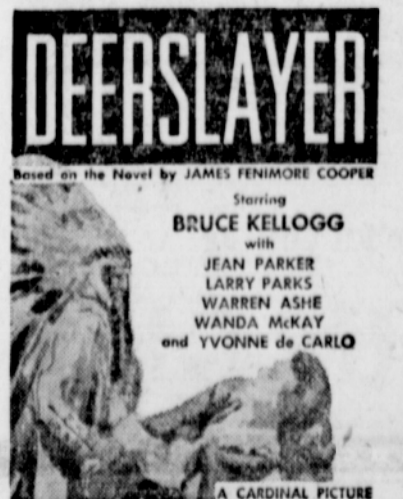

Springfield Ethyl Alcohol Plant OK

Construction of a plant at Springfield, Ore., to produce ethyl alcohol from wood waste has been approved by the alcohol section and the executive committee of the chemical bureau of the War Production board, Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said at Washington Friday.

The action was on an application of the Willamette Valley Wood Chemical Co., Eugene, Ore., which now goes to the facilities committee of WPB and to the board itself for consideration.

The plant, to cost \$2,200,000, is designed to produce 4,000,000 gallons of alcohol a year at a cost of approximately 25 cents a gallon.

"The plant will produce alcohol at less than a third of the cost of producing it now," Ellsworth said.

"I am hopeful that this will be only the first of a series of such plants to be constructed in the Pacific Northwest to convert a waste product into a critically needed war material."

POSTAL INCREASE HIGHLIGHTS

Many postal items will be affected by the increase in rates effective March 26th. The only increase in first class mail is on local letters, boosted from two to three cents per ounce. Letters to outside points within the United States will go at the 3 cents per ounce rate. Parcel post will be increased approximately .01 cent per pound. New book rates are 4 cents for first pound, 3 cents for each additional pound. Library books go at 64 cents for first pound and one cent for each additional pound. Minimum registry fees increased from 15 to 20 cents and graduated to \$1.35. New issue of 8 cent air mail stamps will be on sale at the local post office March 27th.
