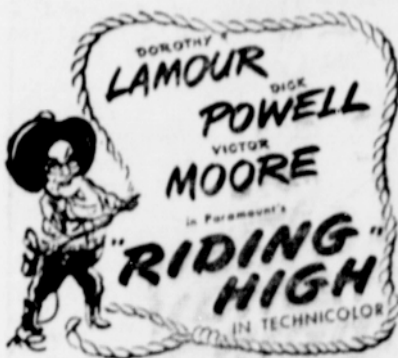

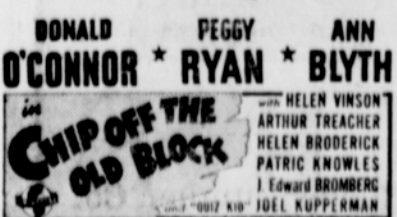

New Accident Rules Effective On June 30, 1944

In a report filed with Governor Earl Snell, the State Industrial Accident Commission Saturday announced a general reduction of employer contribution rates to the fund averaging approximately 10 per cent. The new rates become effective on July 1, 1944, and continue for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1945.

A total of 161 rates were decreased that will result in an annual saving to employers of approximately \$800,000. The reductions are the largest ever made in the history of the Commission, both for the number of rate classifications reduced and the total saving to employers.

Among the more important reductions are:

Farming — from \$4.00 to \$3.50 (Per hundred dollars of payroll) to produce an estimated saving of \$50,000 to the 9,000 farmers of the state operating under the Act.

Western Oregon logging — from \$10 to \$9.50.

Eastern Oregon logging — from \$6.50 to \$6.00.

Printing and Publishing — from \$6.5 to \$5.50.

General Construction — from \$7.00 to \$6.00.

Construction (Residence) — from \$4.00 to \$3.50.

The total reductions in all classifications affecting the lumber industry will effect a saving for that industry estimated at \$220,000 per year.

Only three rates were increased, two of these by combination with other rate classifications carrying a higher rate. War emergency shipbuilding was increased from \$1.96 to \$2.10.

Four new rate classifications were adopted by the Commission, covering the distillation of wood products, manufacture of plastics, covering the distillation of wood products, manufacture of pumps, and contractors permanent storage yards.

Harris Ellsworth to Seek Reelection to 4th Congressional Dis.



Harris Ellsworth, congressman from the Oregon 4th district, today filed his declaration for reelection to this office, subject to the action of the republican primary. Ellsworth's announcement that he would be a candidate for reelection came as no surprise, since he is serving out his first term as congressman and as he says is now beginning to learn his way around Washington. If elected, he says: "I shall continue to work hard on all problems of my district and state and for the development of its resources. I stand for peace with victory only and for a peace settlement with permanency as its goal. I shall work to curb bureaucrats, reduce federal extravagance and stop waste."

One outstanding accomplishment of Ellsworth's term of office is the fact that he pioneered the utilization of wood waste and says that he has been amazed at the alcohol from wood waste program's rapid development and "it now appears in addition to the 4,100,000 gallon plant that may shortly be built in Lane county, we may go ahead on a major program, which may not only involve the construction and operation of some six or eight plants in the fourth district, but a national program of wood waste utilization."

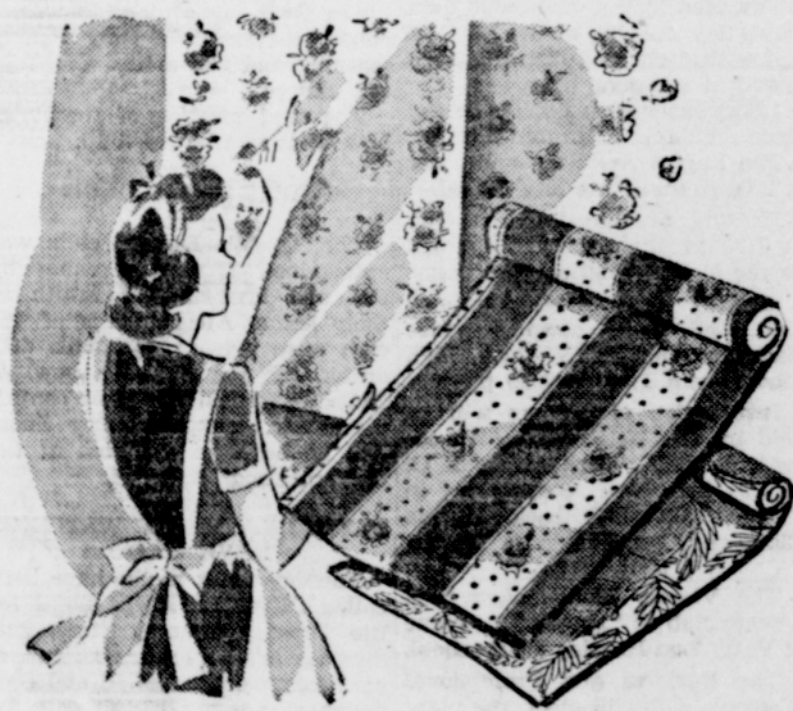
