R. Claude Gray to Seek Coroner's Office

R. Claude Gray, a prominent and long time resident of Eugene was here Tuesday meeting the people of Cottage Grove and announced that he has filed his declaration as a candidate for county coroner on the republican ticket. The county coroner, incidentally, is one of the two county offices where two or more candidates have filed a declaration. Other county candidates are as yet unopposed.

Mr. Gray has been a resident of Eugene since 1890, was educated in the Eugene schools, attended the University of Oregon and was a member of the 1904 football team, coached by Dick Smith which won the northwest championship. He was connected with the First National Bank of Eugene for 23 years, leaving the bank in 1932 to enter the funeral business and at present is assistant manager of the Veatch-Hollingsworth Funeral Home in Eugene and is a graduate of the College of Mortuary Science at St. Louis, Missouri.

He is also a member of the First Christian church, serving as superintendent of the Sunday school for a number of years. Also past chancellor of the K. P. lodge and member of the Kiwanis club, Willakenzie grange and sheriff's mounted posse.

Because of his qualifications, his friends have urged him to seek the republican nomination of the county coroner.

Secretary of War Stimson said today that army casualties—dead, wounded, missing and prisoners—amounted to 126,193 up to March 7.

The navy's casualties—navy, marines and coast guard—are 42,099.

Julia offers
2 exciting ways
to use eggs!

YOUNG BILL gave me his orders for lunch the other day: "And I'd like three eggs scrambled, please!"

And then I got to thinking about other uses for eggs—and how they can be an important part of every meal, right through the day. Examples:

EGG NESTS FOR BREAKFAST
Toast six 3½-inch rounds of bread on one side. Top toasted side with broiled or fried bacon or ham (these could be omitted if not available). Beat 6 egg whites until foamy; add salt and white pepper, continue beating until stiff but not dry. Pile meringue lightly on toast rounds; with rounded end of egg shell make slight indentation in each meringue; gently slip a yolk into center of each nest. Bake on cookie or baking sheet in moderate oven (350° F.) about 10 minutes or until egg yolk is set. Serves 6.

OMELETTE SUPREME FOR LUNCH
6 eggs ¼ cup milk
1 tsp. salt 2 tsp. shortening
1 tsp. enriched egg
Beat eggs well; add salt, flour, and milk. Continue beating until light and foamy. Melt shortening in heavy frying pan; pour in egg mixture. As mixture browns on under side, pull outside edges to center of the pan, letting the uncooked mixture run to the edges; continue until all of the mixture is set; cover; cook slowly until set and well browned, about 5 minutes. Uncover; cut one-inch slit on outer edge of opposite sides; fold rough center; turn into hot serving platter. Serve immediately plain, or spread with preserves, or sprinkle with cheese. Serves 6.

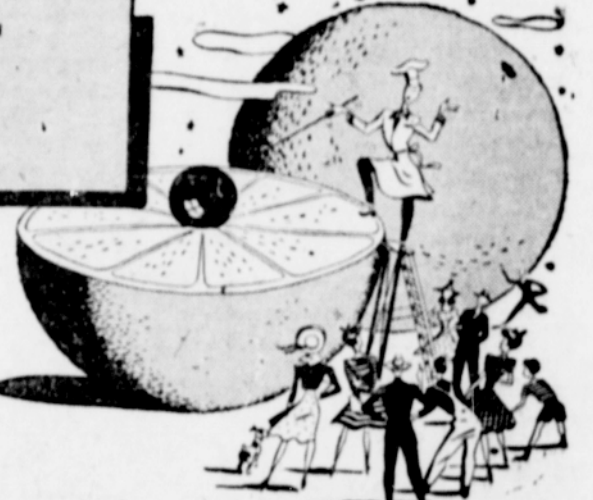
