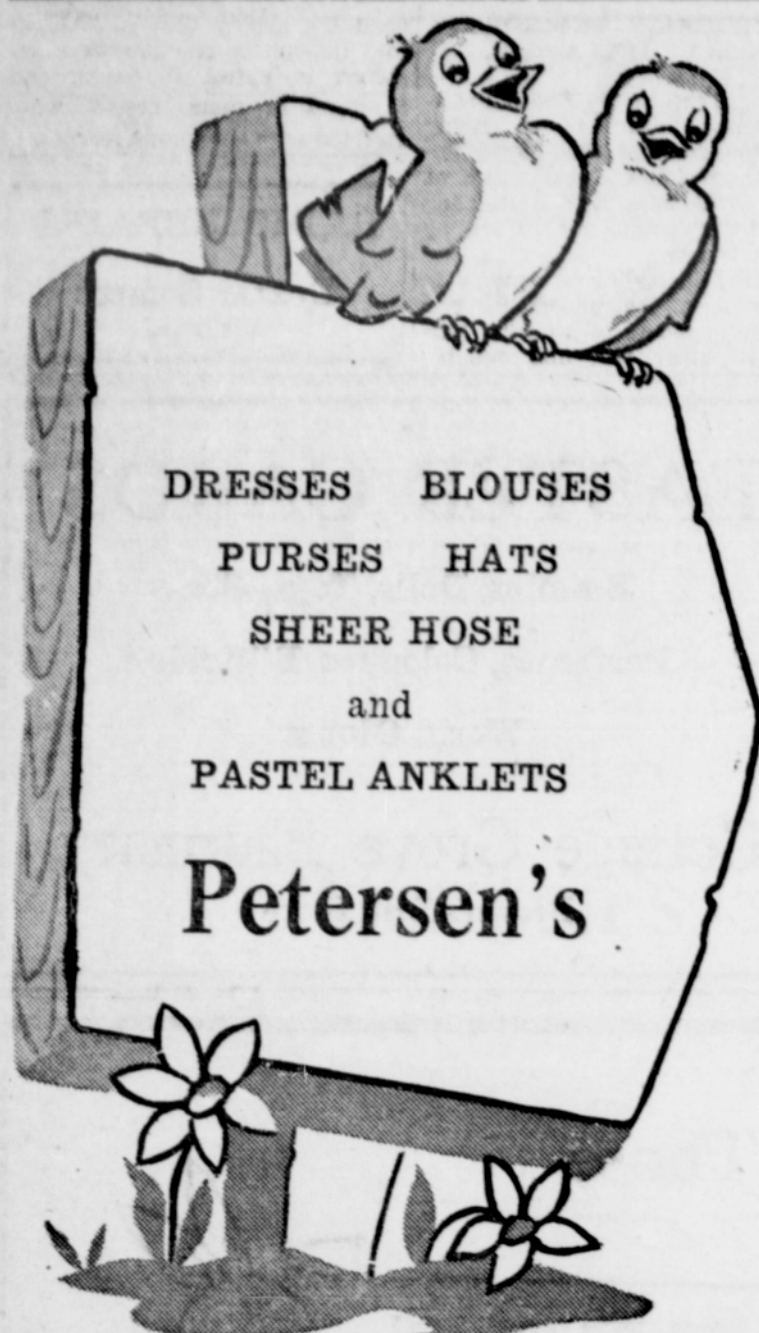




CITY BRIEFS
