

O & C Timber Sales Over \$1,000,000 Since July, 1943

W. H. Horning, chief forester for the general land office of the department of the interior, reports that thirty-nine million nine hundred fifteen thousand (39,915,000) board feet of timber on the Leaveston Oregon and California railroad grant was sold at the regular monthly sale held April 11. The timber sold in this sale was on thirteen widely distributed areas, located in various counties in western Oregon. The total sale price was \$1,376,550.

The total sales of O & C timber since July 1, 1943, amount to three hundred four million one hundred seven thousand (304,107,000) board feet and sold for \$1,016,022.33.

Timber sold from O & C lands has contributed substantially to the sawmills and plywood plants in this area in filling the needs of our armed forces for lumber and other wood products. Most of the timber cut from government lands in western Oregon is obtained from the O & C lands.

The timber on the O & C lands is cut according to requirements of sustained yield management. The total supply of timber available on these lands is ample to permit the perpetual harvesting of 500,000,000 board feet annually. Management practices are in effect which accomplish prompt reforestation of lands after ripe timber is cut. In general, this is done by leaving numerous trees for the natural reseeding of all such areas. In places, fire has taken such a heavy toll of the green timber that reforestation by such natural methods is impractical. Where that is the case, the damaged areas are reforested by the planting of nursery-grown seedlings. This season the foresters of the O & C Administration are planting 1,000,000 trees on such an area which was devastated by fire in the disastrous Tillamook burn of 1933. While contributing heavily to the needs of war, the management of these lands looks to the future and prepares to supply the endless needs of peace after the war.

Sir, I am forwarding my marriage certificate and my two children. One is a mistake as you can see.

Please find out for certain if my husband is dead, as the man I am living with won't eat or do anything till he knows for sure. In answer to your letter, I gave birth to a boy weighing 101 lb. I hope this is satisfactory.

I have no children and my husband is a truck driver and works day and night.

You changed my girl to a boy. Does this make any difference.

In accordance with your instructions, I have given birth to twins in the enclosed envelope.

I am told that my husband sets in the YMCA every night with the piano playing in his uniform. I think you will find him there.

Somewhere in the South Pacific (Delayed)—The International Olympic Games Committee and the National Amateur Athletic Union may never adopt the "canteen race," but to United States Marines here it outranks the conventional 220 or 100-yard dashes. Legend has it that the idea of the "canteen race" was born shortly after the Marines had invaded this once Jap-held base. On numerous occasions Japanese batteries opened up during meal time. With tray and canteen in hand, Marines sprinted for cover, balancing their food and drink expertly as they ran.

The "canteen race" has replaced the old sack race. Here's how it is done:

The contestants, usually four in number, line up with their cups filled to the brim with water. The starter's gun starts them over a 50-yard course that is purposely dotted with holes, logs and other debris. Unlike other races, speed is not the essence, the winner being judged by the amount of water remaining in the cup.
