'Sahara' Filmed on Scorching Sands

Columbia's epic of desert warfare, "Sahara," which stars Humphrey Bogart and is coming to the Arcade Theatre April 21 and 22 was filmed entirely in a spot in the Imperial Valley Desert, which is 200 feet below sea level. Just two miles away is the Salton Sea, which is 244 feet below sea level. Needless to say, the actors in the cast spent many uncomfortable days and were actually almost as worn out as they look in most of the scenes in the picture.

The location of "Sahara" was the lowest level at which a picture has been made since the filming of "Greed" years ago in Death Valley, which is 346 feet below sea level. Death Valley and the Salton Sea are the second and third lowest spots on earth. The first is the Dead Sea, which is down to the suffocating depth of 1400 feet.
