THE SENATE NEEDS CORDON

This year the voters will have to get along without the personal contact element usual to political campaigns because of war conditions. Particularly is this so in the candidacy of Guy Cordon, former Roseburg resident, now trying to fill his post as senator interim. From the time of his appointment to the post of the late senator Chas. McNary, Cordon could have spent his time beating the bushes in a vote getting campaign. Instead he chose to remain at his post of duty. If he is elected it will be up to his friends to do the job. The fact he decided to remain in Washington to do what he could to further the interest of the state and nation should be given sympathetic consideration by the voters in both the primary and the general election, should he be the republican nominee.

There are several factors in this senate campaign that should have a personal appeal to voters of this section so far as Cordon is concerned. First of all he is a home man and knows the needs of his district and state. His constituents don't have to draw a picture of the things needing attention here when writing the congressional representative. Second he has been in Washington long enough to know his way around and already knows the necessary procedure which might take as high as four years for a new man to learn. Third, he knows how to turn out the work.

BETTER DIRT ROADS

Military roads and airports have been rendered usable by our armed forces on various fronts by application to the surface of a new, patented resin compound, called Stabimol, which "waterproofs soil" so that during rainy weather vehicles will not become bogged down in the mud.
