Holman Makes 3 Stops Here on Campaign Tour

Senator Rufus Holman made three appearances here Friday morning in a hurried campaign to cover Lane county in his campaign for reelection on the republican ticket to the United

States senate. He first addressed the employees of the W. A. Woodard Lumber Co., and told the workers there that he had always operated union plants and businesses and sponsored prevailing union wages for municipal, county and state employees when he was county commissioner of Multnomah county.

He made the second address to the students of the Cottage Grove union high school and reviewed for them the functions of the three branches of the federal government; the duties of a senator and representative and the functions of the executive branch. He was received by Supt. H. B. Ferrin, who showed the senator's party through the new union high school building.

At a noon luncheon at the Rainbow cafe, Senator Holman discussed informally the issues of the day and pulled "no punches" in his informal talk, saying frankly that he felt that if the new deal was again returned to power this fall, the republic as we know it is done for. He told supporters assembled at the luncheon that he had worked hard at the job of senator, had been accused of being anti semetic because opposed the sale of junk and scrap iron to Japan prior to the outbreak of the war and was also accused of be-

ing an isolationist because he favored the restriction of immigration. Notwithstanding his stand and the stand of many other congressmen, he said over 600,000 refugees from the occupied countries have entered this country since the war, many of them illegally.

He also issued a statement hitting at what he termed the dishonesty of "my unprincipled opponent and his supporters" in refusing charges made by them that his conduct was irregular when he resigned as state treasurer and took the oath of office as United States senator.
