

Forty-nine Rodent Control Supervisors Appointed for County

Forty-nine rodent control supervisors for 1944 were appointed last week by the Lane county court on recommendation of O. S. Fletcher, county agent. These people were nominated by 16 Granges and will lead voluntary ground squirrel control work in their respective communities and will also have authority to go upon neglected land and poison squirrels at the expense of the owner.

Gray digger ground squirrel control work is carried on in Lane county in accordance with Chapter XXVI Oregon Code 1930 and amendments thereto, and all of the county is a squirrel control district in accordance with this law. Notice to all persons owning or having dominion over land in the county to exterminate ground squirrels was given during April by the county agent, who is responsible under the law for the ground squirrel control program.

Keep Eggs Cool

Eggs which are kept cold, covered, and moist, as in the hydrator of a refrigerator, will retain their fresh qualities for several weeks. Tests made at the Massachusetts State college in Amherst also show that the cardboard cartons in which eggs are usually delivered keep eggs fresh for some time. Refrigeration in any container is of course better than leaving eggs at room temperatures. The main point is to keep the eggs in some sort of covered dish. This prevents loss of moisture. Also keep the temperature of the refrigerator at approximately 41 degrees.

Close Rows

For the small garden, particularly for a beginner, close planted rows and hand cultivation are better than wide spaced rows for horse or tractor cultivation. Small hand cultivators or hoes are inexpensive and easy to use at odd moments. If the garden is small, much more food can be produced by close planting of the rows.

Games With String

The string figure game known as "cat's cradle" is widely played among African children. Complicated figures are constructed and competitions are held in which children challenge one another. Speed and accuracy decide the winner. Such string games are played by native tribes of Australia, and seem to be almost world-wide.
