Friends here will be interested in the marriage of Yeoman 3/C Joan Rosemary Morris of the WAVES and HA 1/C Francis Alden Garoutte who were united at a ceremony standing upon a satin improvised stairs before the altar of the First Presbyterian church at Hanford, California. The ceremony was read by the Rev. H. V. Hartsough at a single ring ceremony before a group of 250 relatives and friends.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Morris of Idaho Springs, Colorado, former Cottage Grove residents. The groom is the son of F. Earl Garoutte of Culp Creek and Mrs. C. G. Newbecker of Hanford, California.

The ceremony was solemnized Saturday evening, April 22, the church being almost completely in a colonial fashion with palm background and bouquets of cala lilies and white iris dominating and tall candelabra arranged on each side. The lovely bride, given in marriage by Dr. C. G. Newbecker, donned an egg shell pink satin bridal gown with fitted bodice and full skirt. The lace trimming matched that of the trimming of the flowing satin train which was part of the dress. Watch for Lice

Although lice are more prevalent in warm weather, they may still bother the layers later. An occasional inspection of the flock to see whether or not lice are present is worthwhile. And if any of the birds appear dumpy, listless, and scratch considerably, by all means look at such birds to see if they have lice. Lice sap the strength and vitality of birds and prevent layers from doing their best.

Log Jam

The largest log jam is thought to have occurred on the St. Croix river in Minnesota, June, 1898. More than 150,000,000 board feet of logs were piled in a mass which extended for miles. A crew of 200 men, 100 horses, 2 steamboats, and a donkey engine required six weeks to break it.

Scrap Use
In making a ton of steel from scrap metal, the mills save two tons of limestone and coke which are required to make the steel directly from high-grade iron ore.

Clean Up After Crop

Some gardeners feel that the best way to clear the garden is to wait until late fall when all the crops are harvested. Actually, if left this way the job seldom gets done. A better plan is to follow each crop harvest with a cleanup, onions one week, sweet corn the next, tomatoes, cabbage and so on, as harvests stretch over several months.

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
