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10 P. M. Curfew Ordinance to Be Enforced

City police officers have been instructed by the city council to enforce the provisions of city No. 1138, an ordinance passed in 1936, regulating the curfew hours and providing a penalty of a fine or jail sentence for the parent or guardian of youths under seventeen years who are found loitering or loafing on the streets after the prescribed hours. This ordinance provided that the curfew hour be changed after June 1 to October 1 of each year from 9:00 to 10:00 p. m. and the parent or guardian of any person under seventeen years of age found loitering on the streets from 10:00 p. m. to 5:00 a. m. will be subject to a fine of \$10.00 or a five day sentence when arraigned before the city trial officer. The council instructed local officers to give two warnings to delinquents and assess a fine on the third offense.

The council also instructed officers to enforce the ordinance with reference to the sale of tobacco to minors.

Robert Graham, director of the summer recreation project appeared before the council and asked the use of the play equipment at the city park. Mr. Graham stated that additional equipment would be purchased and the present equipment cared for. The request of Mr. Graham was granted. On a letter of recommendation from Worth Harvey, city treasurer the council agreed to purchase 16,000.00 in U. S. treasury bonds, as security for the city deposit in the First National Bank.

In a letter to the city, the Lane county health association asked that a sewerage disposal and water works improvement be included in the post war plans.

Cleanup day for residents of the city of Cottage Grove was set for Monday June 12th. Trash or garbage will be hauled away in city hired or city owned trucks, provided trash or garbage is placed at the property curbing in a suitable container. Waves Take Half Of Navy Jobs

WAVES have taken over nearly half of the jobs in the navy department in Washington, D. C.—a fact which shows what a vital part women in blue are taking in the war, it is revealed by Chief W. E. Bell of the Eugene navy recruiting station.

It was in December, 1942, that the first 300 trained navy women reported to the navy department to begin the program of releasing for duty at sea or overseas many of the men who had been stationed in Washington to meet the expansion emergency created by the war.

Since that time women's reserve personnel, both office and enlisted, have been arriving in the capital steadily, sometimes at the rate of 1,000 a month, and have been assigned to every type of activity within the navy department.

A measure of the degree to which women have taken over an important part of the work at the headquarters of the navy is shown in the following: On March 31, 1944, enlisted women outnumbered men more than 2 to 1. In the bureau of naval personnel and in the communications division of the office of the chief of naval operations, the ratio was even higher—3 to 1. A year ago, on March 31, 1943, the ratio was six enlisted men for every enlisted woman. In one bureau of the Navy department, 163 enlisted men were detached last month for duty elsewhere and their places taken by 158 newly reported WAVES.

Cleanup Week Set For June 12 to 18

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday, Cleanup week was set beginning Monday June 12th. This is a few days later than usual for such undertakings, but still not too late to effectively dispose of weeds, grass, overhanging limbs and vines and brush to make the community safer, healthier and more attractive. In commenting on "Cleanup Week" Mayor S. L. Mackin expressed a wish that property owners might cooperate to do three things, cut weeds and grass while still green and before the weeds and grass die and become hard to cut. Cut overhanging limbs, vines and briars away from the sidewalks and repair sidewalks to make them safer for pedestrian traffic. Remembering that there has been several threats from the post office department to discontinue mail delivery in the city where pedestrian traffic is impeded by overhanging limbs, briars or bushes or poor sidewalks, it would be well to improve the sidewalks around your property where needed.

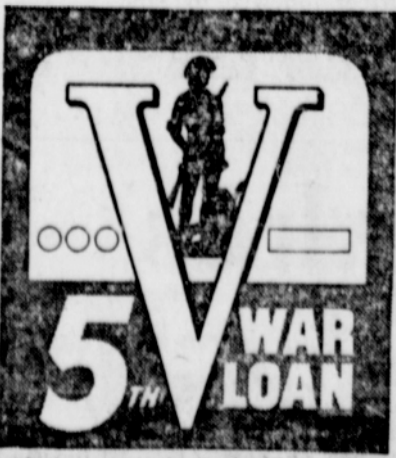

Joe Young, a prisoner of war in a Japanese camp near Tokyo, Japan was heard in a broadcast June 1st, by both Mrs. J. R. Young, his wife and Mrs. J. E. Young, his mother. This was the first word heard from Mr. Young, a former radio operator on Wake Island since September 1943. The broadcast heard here was also heard in other sections of the nation and was confirmed by a telegram received June 3rd from Lerch, acting provost marshal at Washington D. C.

We quote part of the telegram, "Hello mother and Irene, hope you are listening to this, as you can see for yourself that I am still in good spirits and able to talk as much as ever. Have received mail and packages from you and several letters from the kids and Fran Catherine's last letter has been read by all the kids and much appreciated. I was glad that Joe and Faye are doing so well in school. You better get a little ahead so we can take time off for fishing. All the fellows that came up here with me are in good health. Irene will have her big anniversary on June 11th, so I wish her many happy returns. Been some time since you heard from me. I know you are all well and assure you that I am the same. So all I can say is love and kisses to all of you till some later date and say good bye." Joe R. Young.

Appended to the telegram was, "This broadcast supplements previous official reports received from International Red Cross."

Federal Car Stamps To Go on Sale the 10th

The \$5.00 federal car stamp will be on sale at the local post office June 10th. The stamp, required of all motorists will be on sale at first and second class post offices (local post office) until May 31st next year, but at 3rd and 4th class post offices the sale expires July 31 after which date it must be secured through the collector of internal revenue. Purchases may be made at the stamp window and motorists are advised to get the stamp as early as possible to avoid the rush.

D-Day Invasion Makes Progress In 48 Hours

The D day invasion of the European continent starting early Tuesday and now about forty eight hours in progress has been received as the most stirring news since the start of the present war over four years ago. Business was not as usual Tuesday morning here and was virtually suspended in some places as the public stuck by the radio and quite a few radio listeners made a night of the early Tuesday morning broadcasts, telling of a few meager details of the start of the invasion in which 4,000 ships and 11,000 planes are said to have taken part in transporting troops across the English channel.

Resistance has been light thus far, but is stiffening as German motorized divisions move in. Likewise casualties have also been light. This morning the allied troops are reported to have cleared a beach head in France approximately 100 miles in length. Names of the localities where the allies are forging ahead are withheld with the exception of the Caen area, lest the information give aid to the enemy.

This morning neutral sources forecast an invasion of Southern France as a strong fleet of allied ships continue to cruise off the coast. In the east the Russians are reported to be preparing to launch another drive against the Germans.

Fighting on the French beach heads is confused with no definite lines established. The average depth of penetration is twelve miles. In Italy the allies have advanced ten to twelve miles north and west of Rome and have beaten down disorganized attempts of the German army for a counter attack.

Miss Abigail Trask has been chosen by the American legion auxiliary to attend Girl's State, Mrs. Hester Reed, unit chairman announced here Monday. Girls from over this state are chosen by the auxiliary for those showing leadership ability and practical workings of a democratic form of government. Those arriving at camp Sunday will be assigned quarters and will begin their program in government operation the following day.

Meats, Fats
Red Stamps A8 through T8 good indefinitely. U8, V8 and W8 become valid June 4 and remain good indefinitely.

Processed Fruits, Vegetables
Blue stamps A8 through V8, good indefinitely.

Most Plentiful Foods
Onions, carrots, spinach, white potatoes, oranges, peanut butter and citrus marmalade.

Sugar
Sugar stamps 30 and 31 each are good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar Stamp 32 becomes good for five pounds, June 16th. Sugar Stamp 40, good for five pounds of canning sugar through February, next year.

Gasoline
A-11 coupons are good through June 21.

Tire Inspection Deadlines
Regular inspections not required after April 20.

Fuel Oil
Periods 4 and 5 coupons, good through September 30. New period 1 coupons for the 1944-1945 heating year may be used as soon as they are received from local boards.

Shoes
Airplane Stamp 1 and 2, good indefinitely.
