HED WAC RECRUITER

Lt. Barbara S. Smith, Air Wac recruiting officer for Lane County will make headquarters at the city hall, Cottage Grove the week of June 12th thru 16th for the purpose of interviewing women interested in enlisting in the Women's Army Corps to serve as Air Wacs with the Army Air Forces.

Many Cottage Grove women have already enlisted in the WAC and are now serving at Army Air Bases throughout the United States. There are now 239 jobs available to women serving with the Corps and many new advantages have recently been made available to enlistees. Women may now select assignment with the Army Air Forces, Army Ground Forces or Army Service Forces and may also select the station at which she would like to serve her initial assignment should she desire to return to the west coast after basic training. However, the opportunity still exists for assignment throughout any of the United States or overseas at Army Air Bases.

New uniforms have also been recently authorized for Wacs. A tropical worsted summer uniform is now worn by enlisted personnel with a specially designed overseas hat. There is also an off-duty hour dress now ready for distribution that is worn with dress pumps and purse.

Lt. Smith has stressed the urgent need for women to serve with all branches of the Armed Forces as D-Day approaches and many more men and women are being assigned overseas. Women are needed to serve in the field of communications, photography, personnel, drafting or as administrative and office workers, weather observers, drivers, beauticians artists and medical and dental technicians.

Appointments may be made for a personal interview with Lt. Smith by contacting Harry K. Metcalf of the Cottage Grove Civilian Recruiting Committee prior to her arrival or by contacting Lt. Smith at the city hall on or after June 12th.
