The Loyal Order of Moose—Maintain Mooseheart, Illinois, "The City of Childhood," also Moosehaven, Florida, "The Home for the Aged."

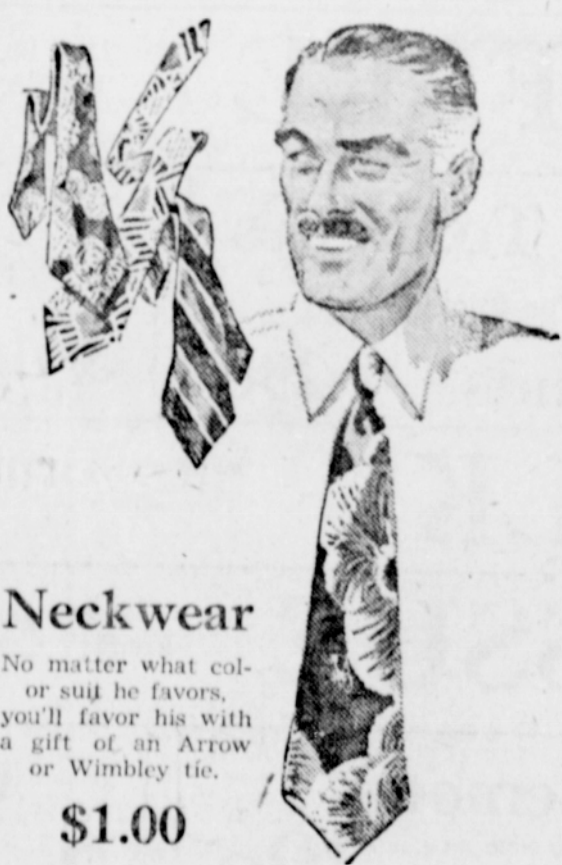
No Organizers

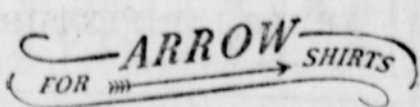
