Movie Town Is Camouflaged

For a time, during the shooting of 20th Century-Fox's production of "The Sullivans," coming to the Arcade Theatre June 25th, the people of the small community of Santa Rosa, California, could hardly tell whether they were coming or going.

One thousand tons of dirt were spread over the town's streets as part of the job of transforming the northern California community into a reasonable facsimile of Waterloo, Iowa, home town of the famous family who gave five sons to the Service, as it appeared twenty-eight years ago.

Orange and grapefruit trees and any other shrubbery which might clash in what appears to be an Iowa landscape were disguised or removed. Street signs were changed and even modern street lights altered.

"The Sullivans," directed by Lloyd Bacon and produced by Sam Jaffe, with Robert T. Kane associate producer, features Anne Baxter and Thomas Mitchell, with Selena Royle, Edward Ryan, Trudy Marshall, John Campbell, James Cardwell, John Alvin, and George Offerman, Jr.

Another bit of business that confounded Santa Rosa citizens was the almost miraculous transformation through which one of the houses was put by studio workmen. The house represented the home of the Sullivan family, through a span of years.
