

Buffalo Bill Is Coming to Arcade Theater July 2-4

Reliable authorities will tell you that more than 20,000,000 words have been printed about Col. "Buffalo Bill" Cody. By simple arithmetic it is evident that that is the equivalent of 200 full-length novels.

But for every word which has been printed about the famous frontiersman-hero, Producer Harry A. Sherman estimates there are two in unpublished manuscript form.

Methodists Assign Church Pastors

Promotion of several young Methodist ministers featured the Northwest conference ending at Portland and S. L. Mackin of the local church was named as lay leader of the Cascade district at the session. The Rev. Frank Brown who has served the local Methodist church as pastor was returned to this charge. Mrs. Alice Camp who has pastored the church at Creswell for several years was also returned. Other assignments included: Fred O. Hunt to Drain-Yonealla circuit; Elkton - Gardiner, Clarence Currier.
