From an air base in India—The Tenth Air Force Headquarters in India announce the awards of the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal to Technical Sergeant Harold E. Bede, 35, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Bede, 2316 N. E. 42nd avenue, Portland, Oregon.

The citation to the Distinguished Flying Cross read in part: "for extraordinary achievement by participating in heavy bombardment missions totaling more than two hundred hours during which exposure to enemy fire was probable and expected. On these missions he has exhibited keen perception and appreciation of the importance of his assignments and relation to the combat crew as a member thereof. The execution of his assigned duties with coolness and courage under enemy fire is worthy of the best traditions of the Army Air Forces."

T/Sgt. Bede has been in the Army Air Forces two years and has been on duty in India for the past year as an Engineer Gunner with the famous Seventh Bombardment Group, a Tenth Air Force Unit operating in the Strategic Air Force, Eastern Air Command.

successfully passed the army-navy qualifying test given March 15, and who enlist in the army enlisted reserve corps before the deadline of July 1, 1944. Orlando John Hollis, acting president of the University of Oregon, announced last week after receiving information from Major General David McCoach, commanding general, Ninth Service Command, Fort Douglas, Utah.

Recruiting offices in the ninth service command in Oregon and Washington at 614 South West Eleventh Avenue, Portland, and 800 Lloyd Building, Seattle, have the necessary facilities for medical examinations and forms for enlistment. All men under 18 must have either parents' or guardian's consent.

BLUE STAMPS FOR PROCESSED FOODS

Five more blue stamps totaling 50 points—W-8; X-8; Y-8; Z-8 and A-5—will be good for buying rationed processed foods on July 1. Willard Case, district OPA food rationing representative, said Monday.

During July, Case said many housewives will use all of the first strip of blue ration stamps in War Ration Book Four and will begin using the second strip, the first stamp in this strip being A-5.

The first strip contained stamps bearing the figure "8" on their face. The figure "5" is printed on stamps in the second row.

These figures serve for identification of the stamps only, and have no connection whatever with their value, Case pointed out. Regardless of whether food ration stamps have 8, 5, 2 or 1 on their face, they are all worth 10 points. All stamps validated on July 1 will be good indefinitely.

SPECIAL SESSION POSSIBILITY

Possibility that Gov. Earl Snell may call a special session of the Oregon legislature to amend pres-

ent election laws in regard to soldier voting was seen at Salem Thursday after an announcement by the governor that he had been repeatedly urged by members of the legislature and others to do so. "I will do everything possible to insure the war veterans an opportunity to vote," Gov. Snell said.
