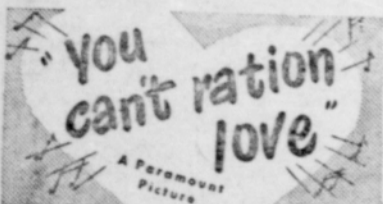

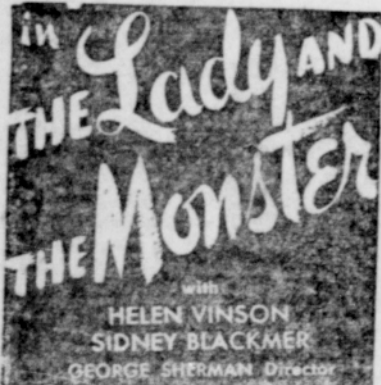


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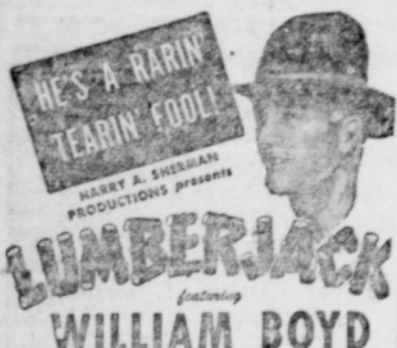

Lane Leads State In Payroll Gain in First Quarter 1944

Lane county led the state in payroll gains for the first three months of 1944 according to a report submitted Saturday by the state unemployment compensation commission. The gain was 37.8 percent over the same period in 1943 and one surprising feature was that the mining industry showed a substantial increase over 1943, the figures being \$27,732.00 for 1943 and \$39,389.00 for 1944. Lumbering and logging was the country's leading industry by a wide margin with products valued at \$3,345,045 for 1943 and \$4,482,071.00 for 1944. Agriculture, forestry and fishing for 1943 was rated as \$10,924.00 for 1943 and \$12,112.00 for 1944.

OREGON'S IDEAS ON 1945 AAA PROGRAM SUBMITTED

Oregon's recommendations for changes or variations in the 1945 agricultural conservation program have been submitted to the western division of AAA by N. C. Donaldson, executive assistant in the state office. The recommendations embody suggestions made by county AAA committee personnel, and the technical advisory committee of Oregon State college.

The first proposal is that no change be made in the practice of eliminating definite farm allowances, tried for the first time this year. The Oregon men believe that earlier so-called soil-building allowances seldom bore any relationship to the soil conservation needs of any particular farm.

The state and county committees were also unanimous in recommending the adoption of a conservation program on a continuing basis which would hold from year to year with only minor alterations.

The Oregon recommendations also include a request, made and denied repeatedly, that construction of liquid manure tanks be recognized as a practice because "no other single practice would conserve so much fertility that is now being lost."

guidance for establishment of veterans, war workers and farm youths on farms after the war, the Interbureau Committee of the Department of Agriculture points out that most of the good agricultural land in the United States already is in farms. Approximately one and one-half million veterans with farm experience will be demobilized following the war, many of the

three million war workers with farm experience may wish to return to farming, and thousands of farm youths will be looking forward to a place in agriculture, the Committee reported. "Intensification, improvement and further development in productive land areas" might make 350,000 family farms available during the five years after the war, and if ad-

ditional farms are needed, perhaps 300,000 more could be developed within 10 years, through reclamation, the Committee said.
