**News Briefs**

American casualties in the conquest of Saipan, principal island of the western Pacific Marianas group, totaled 15,053 men, including 2359 killed, 11,481 wounded and 1213 missing, Navy Secretary James W. Forrestal reported Wednesday at Washington.

At the same time, Forrestal said that in the period ending Monday, Japanese dead buried by American troops numbered 11,948.

He added an estimate that probably 95 per cent of the Japanese garrison, which probably numbered "in excess of 20,000," died in futile defense of the island.

In a letter to Democratic Chairman Robert E. Hannigan, made public Tuesday, President Roosevelt declared he will accept re-nomination by the democratic

national convention meeting in Chicago next week and will serve another four years in the White House if elected. Hannegan told the president in a letter dated July 10th that enough votes had been pledged to secure his nomination. In the meantime Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt in Dayton, Ohio told a news reporter that her husband's decision to accept the fourth term was news to her and that the president did not usually discuss such things with her.

Press dispatches yesterday disclosed that a boost in the manufacture of civilian goods was slated to start August 15th. The output of goods will have to have the approval of WPB field offices. The order according to Donald M. Nelson will go into partial effect Saturday starting with the lifting of curbs on aluminum and magnesium. The staggering schedule agreed on by all factions plans to give the manpower commission time to perfect its plan and is ultimately intended to give work to men and machinery left

idle by the cut in arms production, which will come when Germany falls.

**Faces Brain**
