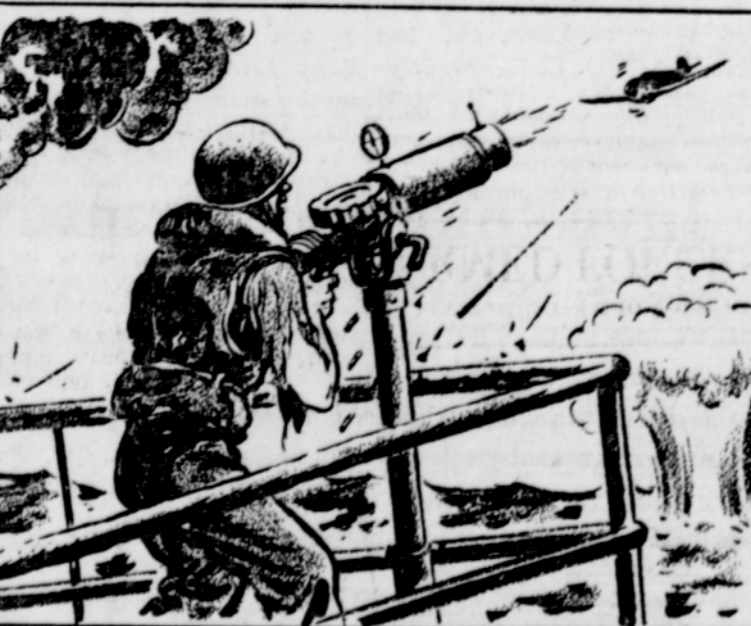

Poultry Flocks
Of the more than 423,000,000 hens on 5,150,000 American poultry-producing farms, over 80 per cent are in so-called farm flocks ranging up to 400 hens. Flocks of over 400 birds, classified as commercial, make up only slightly more than 1 per cent of all flocks, but produce nearly 19 per cent of the country's eggs. Half of the flocks in the United States have around 50 hens each and produce 17 per cent of the total egg output. About a third of the flocks have between 50 and 200 birds.

Tobacco Mosaic
Growers of tomato plants should not use any form of tobacco when working with the crop, as the tomato mosaic virus is in nearly all smoking and chewing tobacco. A smoker may remove the virus from his hands by washing with soap.

Prevents Clotting
The element in sweet clover which causes a type of bleeding disease in cattle is now being adapted to use in human medicine to prevent dangerous post-operative blood clots.

Dry Smoothly
After washing overalls in soapy water, rinse twice but only wring out the first water. Hang on the line dripping wet. You will be surprised how smooth they will be when dry.

Keep Warm
The average casualty rate in a beginning flock of 25 chicks is three or four. It is important to keep them warm for the first six weeks, and this can easily be accomplished by a homemade hover, equipped with light bulbs.
