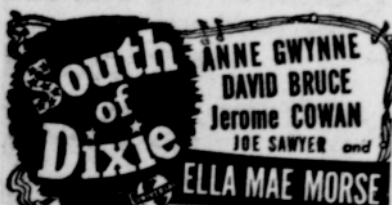

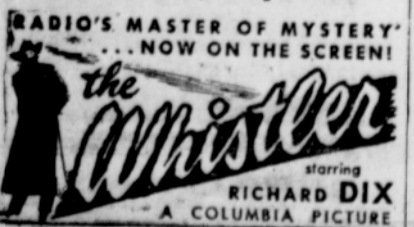
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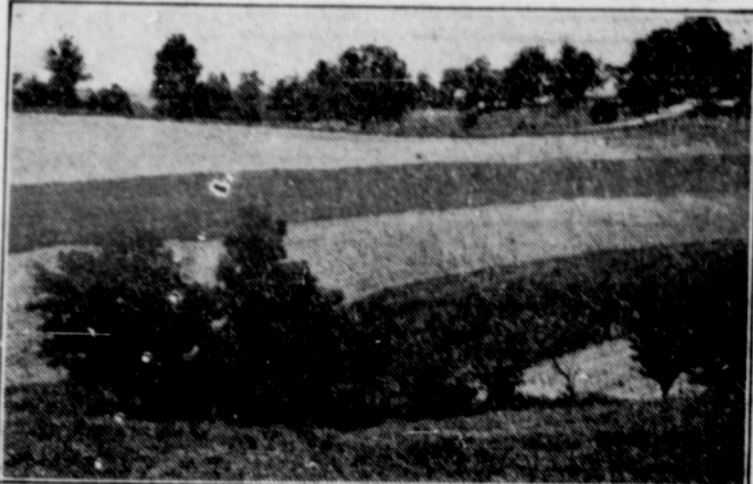

DRIVE-IN SHOPS

The citizen who sighs for the good old days may find, in the postwar world, that one phase of yesterday's life—the crossroads emporium—is returning.

Recently, Joseph Reiss, head of the advertising company bearing his name, predicted that 249,000 drive-in "shops"—Offering the products of thousands of manufacturers—will be built within five years after the war's end.

Tomorrow's roadside establishments, however, will be a far cry from the general store of the horseless-carriage era. Likewise, they will depart sharply, Mr. Reiss forecasts, from pre-war roadside "antique shops" and refreshment stands. Rites for Drowned Victim Held Today At Comstock

Rites for Marbara Joan Smith, 2½ year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Smith, will be held this afternoon at the Comstock cemetery with the Rev. Frank E. Brown officiating and Mills chapel in charge of arrangements. Marbara was drowned Tuesday evening when she fell into Smith Creek, near the home of her parents, about two miles from Drain. The child is said to have presumably slipped or fell into the creek when she followed the family dog that had gone after the cow.

The accident occurred near 7:00 p. m. and she was found a few minutes later, floating on the water. Efforts at artificial respiration failed and she was rushed to a doctor at Drain.

She was born here January 16, 1942. Surviving are her parents and a ten months old sister, Marilyn.

ACCURACY URGED IN SOCIAL SECURITY ACCOUNTS

More than 706,526 men and women in the State of Oregon now have social security account cards. In the years to come, many of these workers will reach age 65, retire from their jobs and claim payments of old-age insurance. Others will die, leaving dependents who are entitled to benefits under the Social Security Act. Every worker wants to be sure that he will get the right insurance checks when he grows old, or that his family will receive the right checks in the right amount, if he dies.

Charles H. Cannon, manager of the Eugene office said today that care and attention to this matter of keeping the records straight, now, might very well mean the difference between the right payments and wrong payments of benefits, later on.

He explained that an individual account is kept for each worker whose name appears on the books of the Social Security Board. The worker's name and number that is assigned to him by the Board are printed at the top of his ledger sheet and also written on record cards that are kept on file.

Contour Maturity

In a short growing season, a crop test showed that grain corn planted on the contour matured 37 per cent of its ears before frost; corn planted in rows up and down hill matured only 37 per cent of its ears.

Makes Steel Brittle

Tiny amounts of hydrogen in steel, even as small as one two-thousandth of a per cent by weight, can make steel brittle.

Portable Shelters Aid in Control of Poultry Diseases

Coccidiosis and other poultry diseases and parasites may be controlled much more easily if portable shelters, feeders and watering equipment are utilized, says County Agent O. S. Fletcher. As a rule, pullets are moved from the brooder house to the range at about eight weeks of age and portable range equipment is a valuable aid in raising good thrifty pullets, Fletcher adds.

N. L. Bennion, Oregon State College extension poultryman, reports it is a well established fact that the only practical way to control coccidiosis is to follow a cleaning program if the birds are confined, or clean and move to new ground if they are on range. If the birds appear sick or droopy it is always a safe procedure to clean equipment and move to new ground, he says.

The number of moves will depend somewhat on weather, size, type of range and trouble encountered from disease. Bennion adds. He recommends moving all equipment 25 to 30 yards about every two weeks. This will not only help to control disease and parasites, but it will avoid killing out of green feed, prevent soil contamination and provide better distribution of fertility.

Better Stock

High production is inherited. No amount of good feed and care can make a high producer out of a chick that is born a low producer. The actual cost of rearing good and poor stock is essentially the same. The great difference is in the way the pullets produce.

MORE CALLS FOR NURSES

A call for qualified nurses to work in Veterans administration hospitals to help provide adequate care for disabled veterans has been issued by the Veterans Administration. Hospitals are classified in three groups—general medical and surgical, tuberculosis and neuropsychiatric. Nurses work an

eight-hour day, six days per week, with rotating shifts and additional compensation for overtime. Living accommodations may be obtained at the hospitals. Interested graduate nurses from recognized schools who are registered should write to Medical Director, Veterans Administration, Washington 25 D. C. A campaign to recruit 8,500 nurses for the army and navy—at the rate of 1,000 a month for the army and 500 a month for the navy—has been announced by the war manpower commission. Nurses in the army now have full authority of their officer rank.

Screen Protects Furniture

Damage to furniture from heat blisters and cracks caused by overheated stoves can be avoided by placing a screen of asbestos cement board between the stove and nearby furniture. This also removes a serious fire hazard. For safety reasons, it is also advisable to place asbestos board between the furnace and combustible materials or walls in the basement.
