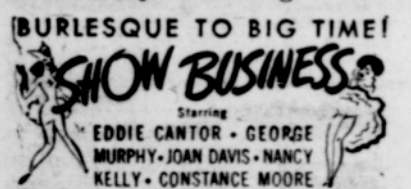

Hydrogen Atom

The atom of hydrogen is the simplest of all the 92 elements which form all the matter known to scientists today. Other atoms are more complicated but they follow the same pattern; there is a nucleus, a tightly constructed center composed of protons and neutrons, which have no electrical charge and around this nucleus are electrons.

Prized Horns

How to make a "Jiffy" cake

THIS CAKE is the magic answer, when you're really in a hurry. Takes only a few minutes to make the batter, and a half-hour to bake. Here's the recipe:

JIFFY CAKE	
1½ cups enriched flour	¾ cup milk
2½ tps. baking powder	½ cup softened shortening
¼ tsp. salt	1 egg
1 cup sugar	1 tsp. vanilla extract

Sift flour; measure; sift into large bowl with baking powder, salt, and sugar. Measure milk into cup; add shortening to fill. Dump milk, shortening, unbeaten egg, and flavoring into flour mixture. Beat with rotary beater 2 to 3 minutes, or until batter is smooth. Pour batter into well greased shallow square cake pan (8x8x2). Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Serve warm or cold, plain or with sauce. Serves 8.

Cup Cakes, too, require surprisingly little time to prepare (summertime suggestions: serve them split and covered with crushed fresh fruit, or with frosting, or with powdered sugar). The recipe:

CUP CAKES	
1½ cups enriched flour	1 cup sugar
2½ tps. baking powder	1 tsp. vanilla extract
¼ tsp. salt	1 egg
½ cup shortening	¾ cup milk

Sift flour; measure; mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening until smooth; gradually add sugar, creaming until fluffy; beat in vanilla and egg. Add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition. Turn into greased muffin pans and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 25 minutes. Makes 18 cakes.
