Marines Fighting On Saipan Come From All of Nation

(By Second Lieutenant Jim G. Lucas, formerly of the Tulsa, Okla., Tribune, a Marine Corps Public Relations Officer.)

Saipan, Marianas Islands--(Delayed)--The communiques have never identified them more definitely than "elements" of the force we put ashore on Saipan June 15. They've done a lot of fighting in the last two weeks. They pushed across southern Saipan to the beaches of Magiciene Bay, and today they're up in the mountains, plunging toward the rear.

They've suffered casualties, and they've paid for every mile they've traveled, but they've exacted return payment from the enemy. They're a proud bunch of men--proud and tired.

They're little different from any other battalion of Marines fighting the battle of Saipan. They come from every part of the United States, and represent a cross-section of America.

Their executive officer, for instance, was an auditor, and one of the best dressed men in the division back at base. Today, his face is unwashed for the third straight day, his hair matted with dirt and sweat. He sits on a rocky ledge, a field telephone in both hands, barking orders to a company on the line. The boys are having a brief counter-attack, and the exec, Major Robert N. Fricke, 1054 Sixth street, Santa Monica, Cal., is promising help.

Major Fricke is talking to Captain George D. Webster, High Point, N. C., who has promised to get help up to the company under attack.

Check some of the platoon leaders, young lieutenants who are there on the front whenever the battalion attacks--

Tom Cox, 1321 South Sixth street, Cottage Grove, Oregon, a salesman and clerk for the Standard Oil Company of California; graduate of the University of Oregon. (Ed's note: Lieutenant Cox was later wounded in action on Saipan.)

These and others - the accountants, the college students, the salesmen - are leading this unit's attack.

Today, it's quiet around the battalion, once you get there. Chances are, however, that you'll run into trouble reaching it, because the boys have bypassed a lot of opposition. If you aren't too timid about enemy machine guns and snipers, you'll find them up in the mountains of Saipan.

The boys say gratefully that it's quiet, although a Jap machine gunner sighted in an hour ago and knocked down two Marines and a Navy pharmacist's mate trying to brew some coffee.

Doctor Richard Porter, Des Moines, Iowa, dirty and tired, the battalion surgeon, yells down to ask if we've had lunch. He tosses down a can of beef and pork loaf, pretty tasteless after 17 days of rations.

First Lieutenant Herbert Hines of 638 Valley Drive, Laguna Beach, Cal., a Marine since April 4, 1938, picks up the can and opens it, and we eat. Hines has been in the thick of the fight from the start.

Dirty, ragged, tired--often living like animals--they make up a battalion.

You couldn't find a better bunch of men anywhere.

Few Suspensions
