Cpl. George Stout Still Ambitious to Become Lawyer

15th ARMY AIR FORCE IN ITALY — When Cpl. George R. Stout, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Stout, Cottage Grove, Oregon, joined the Air Force at the outbreak of the war he had ambitions to become a lawyer. Cpl. Stout still has ambitions to become a lawyer. Twenty-one months of overseas service in combat operations, during which period he serviced the guns on his AAF P-38 fighter-bomber without a single loss due to mechanical deficiency, have not dimmed his hopes.

Through the practical magic of a correspondence course, Cpl. Stout uses his spare moments to "bone up" on his law.

After the war, he hopes to be in a position to get his degree and go into practice. Also interested in farming, Stout will be remembered as an active member of the Future Farmers of America organization in his home state.

Veteran of the African and Sicilian campaigns, Stout has seen his air craft return from over 600 missions into Italy, Germany, Greece, and the various hot spots of the Balkans. Stout's group, commanded by Lt. Col. William P. Litton, Shaw, Miss. is distinguished as one of the top scoring fighter groups in the Theatre, credited with over 485 aerial victories. Recently the group was awarded two Distinguished Unit Citations for outstanding successes in combat operations.

Cpl. Stout has been awarded the European-African-Middle Eastern campaign ribbon with 3 stars, the Good Conduct Medal, and wears the blue and gold trimmed Distinguished Unit Citation bar, with the Oak Leaf Cluster.
