With these being nominated and elected: Wilbur McFarland, president; Mrs. Jessie Kelley, vice president; Almond Hemenway, secretary and treasurer; Belle Burkholder, publicity committee.

Mr. McFarland accepted the election with a speech stating: "I accept on the terms that you will all help to make this meeting an annual success. It has been sixty years since I first attended school in this community, and there are many who have attended 50 or 60 years ago. We are indeed fortunate to have all these people yet with us. We should be able to make this affair an annual event."

Wm. McQueen and Mrs. Hattie Best were from the farthest away, both coming from Portland. Mrs. Best stated her family let her come when they realized she would cry her eyes out if not allowed to attend. She brought an old school mates picture, in which numerous local residents appeared. This was one room of the Cottage Grove school at the time.

Prof. Powell was principal. He married Effie Younger one of his students. They still reside in Portland. This picture was sent to Mrs. Best when she stopped in Eugene on her way to the picnic. It belongs to Mrs. and Mrs. W. P. Bennett who reside in Portland.

"Peg" is in poor health due to heart attacks and was unable to be present. They sent their regards to all.

Mrs. May Hart was unable to be present due to lack of bus, and a recent trip to Brownsville. Mrs. Rita Tracy said that Alvie Harvey of San Francisco sent his regrets as traveling is too uncertain now-a-days. The last time he went on a trip he stood up all the way. He feared he could not stand the strain on a long journey. Mrs. Emma Branstetter of Los Angeles, likewise was afraid to start on the trip. She was one of the original founders of the old schoolmates picnic which was started in 1939.

Mrs. Jessie Winecoff Post of Mosby Creek, Disston Rt., wishes to be remembered to the old school mates, having been unable to be present at the picnic because of illness. She attended high school in Cottage Grove and graduated in 1903. There were three graduates in her class and she is the only member now living.

Mrs. Ellen Burton was one of the oldest present. She came from Eugene. She stated she arrived in Cottage Grove in 1882, later removing to Eugene. Mrs. J. C. Templeton of Eugene, wife of one of the early Presbyterian ministers, was also present. She said her husband served as pastor in the local church in 1893, the gay nineties. She read a poem, "Friendship", Mrs. Fanny Wallace Goude entertained with her harmonica to the tune of which several old time songs were sung, with Ed Finnerty acting as song leader.

She also told some amusing incidents of old school days. She stated she lived here almost 79 years, having been born in Coburg and was brought to this community while very young, by her father the Rev. Wallace, an early day Presbyterian minister. He officiated at many weddings, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Teeters being among those present who were married by Rev. Wallace. Mrs. Goude said she could remember when Main St. was a mudhole its entire length, bordered on both sides with a plank walk. These planks were loose and often deposited children of those days in the middle of the mudhole. When they arrived home plastered with mud, an entire change of clothing was necessary, and sometimes parents held a session in the woodshed with the careless children.

Annie Griffin Adams spoke of the wonderful spelling bees they used to hold in the old school house, and the path along the river they trod to reach these affairs. She came here as a small child from South Dakota. Their family home was located where the office of the Woodson Auto Co. now stands. Mrs. Bertha McQueen and Albert Griffin are the other members of the family who still reside here.
