FATHER SOHLER NAMED PASTOR LOCAL CHURCH

The Rev. Louis H. Sohler, assistant pastor at St. Mary's Catholic church in Eugene since 1939, has been appointed pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help church here. Announcement of his new position was made the past week by Most Rev. Edward D. Howard, D.D., archbishop of Portland in Oregon.

The new pastor will be installed by The Rev. Francis P. Leipzig, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic church, Eugene, and dean of this district, the installation to be August 24 at 8:00 p. m. in the local church. In his new position, Father Sohler succeeds the Rev. James Maxwell, who has been named pastor at St. Paul, Oregon.

Father Sohler has served as assistant in Eugene since his ordination in June 1939, except for the first three months, spent in Woodburn parish. During his period as assistant Father Sohler has taken an active part in civic and religious affairs of the Eugene locality.

During the past five years Father Sohler has been chaplain of the Newman club of the University of Oregon. This club provides the religious, social and educational activities for the Catholic students on the campus. Since the enrollment of the military students Father Sohler has been a member of the war emergency council of the university and is a member of the executive board of that organization.

After graduating from St. Mary's high school, Beaverton, Father Sohler took his seminary training at St. Joseph's College, Mountain View, Calif., St. Patrick's Seminary, Menlo Park, Calif., and then became a member of the first ordination class to be graduated from St. Edward's seminary, Seattle.

MEAT POINT CHANGES

Point values for cuts of utility grade beef and utility grade lamb will be reduced to zero and points for pork loins, pork hams, canned fosh will be restricted effective Sunday, August 13, price administrator Chester Bowles announced Thursday. These changes were made with the approval of the War Food Administration.

The point values of cheeses, farm or country butter, and process butter will be increased. The ration value of creamery butter is unchanged at 16 points.

The point values announced today will continue in effect through Saturday, September 2 end of the August rationing period.

SOILS CHIEF COMING TO OREGON; SOCIETY PLANNED

Dr. Robert M. Salter, chief of the U. S. bureau of plant industry, soils, and agricultural engineering, will be an Oregon visitor early in September, when he will inspect cooperative soil research now under way in this state.

While Dr. Salter is in Oregon he will address an organization meeting called by Dr. W. L. Powers, head of the soils department at O. S. C., to form a soil science society of Oregon. The September 5, in the Memorial Union building at O. S. C.

This society, if formed, would become a section of the newly organized Oregon Academy of Science. It would be open to technical workers, growers, and all others interested in practical application of the basic principles of soil science, says Dr. Powers.

CIVILIANS WARNED OF NEW PAPER CUT

WASHINGTON.—The war production board warned Thursday that further curtailments in civilian paper supplies may become necessary to meet increasing demands for wood pulp and paper.

Although newsprint allotments are expected to remain stable during the fourth quarter, it was indicated that book, magazine, and commercial paper allotments may have to be cut slightly as a result of increases in wartime paper needs.

Military requirements of wood pulp in the production of explosives and high tenacity rayon for tires have reached a wartime high, according to Harold Boeschstein, acting director of WPB's forest bureau.

While retail prices on war models of simplified and standardized men's dungarees and overall jackets and men's and boys' bib overalls are increased at all sales levels, effective August 26, under a revision of OPA staple work clothing price regulation, the average retail price of the sanforized chambray work shirt in independent stores will be reduced about 10 cents a garment. Retail prices of other garments on the average will be no higher than at present.
