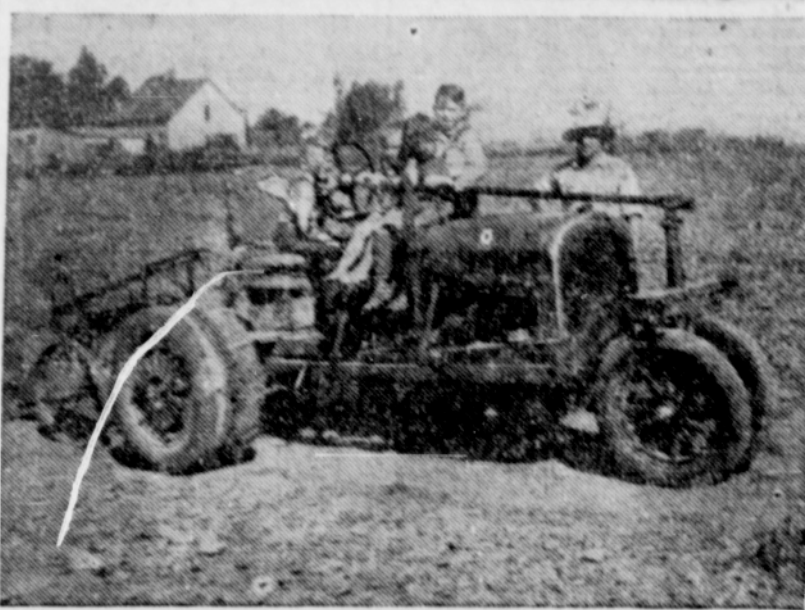

The tractor, parts for which cost \$31.65, has six speeds forward and two reverse, and can do practically any farm operation a factory-made tractor can do. It operates on a gallon of gasoline per acre. Relph's 12-year-old son, Keith, drove the tractor this spring for most of the plowing and cultivation on the Relphs' 120-acre farm near Russell, Iowa. In addition to cooperating in the food production program of the Farm Security Administration, the Relphs all are buying War Bonds and Stamps.
