SARAJANE MOORE, CAPTAIN KUGEL ENGAGE VOWS

Vows were taken before the altar, flanked by tall white candles in candelabra. The Rev. Jesse W. Bunch read the service. Her fingertip veil fell from a flowered crown of white carnations and stephanotis. She carried a white Bible on which lay a small bouquet of white stephanotis and blue lilies-of-the-Nile and from which fell white satin ribbons caught with the white blooms.
