Trained Women's Army Corps medical technicians are helping our wounded and sick soldiers find their way back to health in army hospitals.

Working as physical therapists, X-ray technicians, laboratory and dental technicians, nurses aides, ambulance drivers, admitting officers and record clerks, post office clerks, and librarians, the Wacs give their capable hands and Army learned skills to hard working Army nurses and doctors. Together, doctors, nurses and Medical Wacs assure the American soldier the finest medical attention in the world, with consequent rapid recovery from sickness and wounds.

Any recruit in the Women's Army Corps may request assignment as a Medical Wac, whether or not she has had previous medical experience. After basic training, qualified Medical Wacs are sent directly to medical units assigned to Army stations, evacuation and general hospitals, while others are sent to the WAC School for Medical Technicians at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Wacs who desire to serve as physical therapists must be 44 years of age, must have completed a minimum of two years in an approved college with major emphasis on physical education or biological science, or must be graduates of an accredited course in nursing. They also must have an Army General Classification Test score of 110 or better.

BREAKFAST TUNEUP

3. Other food - 2 servings: Egg - 1 or more - soft cooked or hard cooked in shell, scrambled, creamed, poached, omelet; Whole-grain or Enriched Cereal - 1 serving (at least 1/2 cup); Whole-grain or Enriched Bread with Butter - 1 or more servings.

DDT Saves Crop When Applied to Red Raspberries

Complete control of the oblique banded leaf roller that ruined much of the Gresham berry crop last year was obtained this season by the use of the new wonder insecticide DDT, reports Joe Schuh, assistant entomologist of the O. S. C. experiment station, who has been working on this problem for several years.

As far as known this is the first crop of commercial size on which the new insecticide has been used, as all supplies except experimental quantities have been reserved for the armed forces. Because of the impending certain loss of the crop on hundreds of acres of the raspberries destined for military use, federal officials last spring released 100 pounds of the precious material, which was applied to 250 acres seriously infested.

Dr. G. F. MacLeod, chief of the chemicals division of the War Food administration at Washington, D. C. gave permission for release of the material after Dr. Don C. Mote, head of the department of entomology at O. S. C., and F. J. Becker, secretary of the Gresham Berry Growers, explained personally the seriousness of the situation.

With other insecticides, no more than 85 per cent control has been obtained, which was the same as no control in this instance, explained Schuh, because one worm in fruit when it goes to the cannery would condemn the whole lot.

The DDT was received later than the ideal time for application, but it was applied starting the 17th of May, after the berries were in bloom. The field results proved as complete as previous laboratory trials had indicated, so that more than 99 percent control was obtained and the crop saved. Schuh also reports that careful observations failed to re-

veal any damage to honey bees working the raspberry blooms.

Dr. Mote reports that experimental quantities of the DDT are being tested this summer on a number of other of Oregon's worst agricultural pests and that the results with some are highly promising, although the tests have not been carried far enough to permit definite conclusions.

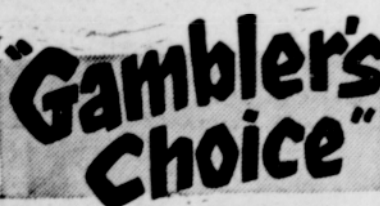
