

He's On The Right Track

Walter Brennan isn't unduly superstitious, but the threemovie Academy Award winner has a number of reasons to believe that his newest film, "Home in Indiana," which 20th Century-Fox filmed in Technicolor from the Saturday Evening Post story, "The Phantom Filly," by George Agnew Chamberlain, is blessed with more than its share of good omens for success.

It is, for instance, the third time Brennan has appeared in pictures dealing with racing horses, and completes the three phases of the sport. In "Kentucky," running races furnished the background; "Maryland" was based on steeplechasing, and "Home in Indiana" depicts the adventure and romance of Grand Circuit harness racing.

Moreover, all three films found their titles in the name of the states most closely associated with each type of racing, and each boasts the benefit of Technicolor photography.

To conclude the unusual parallel, Brennan points out that each picture flies the 20th Century-Fox banner.

"Home in Indiana" opens Sept. 3 at the Arcade Theatre.

HISTORIC ONION IN LUSCIOUS MEAT COMBINATIONS

It's welcome news that onion crops this year far surpass any previous production in the United States. A member of the lily family and cultivated from time immemorial, the onion was represented on ancient Egyptian monuments and European cooks long ago placed it among the food for gourmets. The onion, like most vegetables, is high in food value but it is especially appreciated as a seasoning and to whet the appetite for less flavorful foods. With meats and salads it is particularly good, used as a seasoning.

Stuffed Onions
5 or 6 large onions
3 tablespoons lard
1/2 cup chopped celery
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1 cup ground cooked meat
1 cup bread crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
Pepper

Skin the onions, cut in half crosswise, simmer in salted water until almost tender, and drain. Remove the centers without disturbing the outer layers and chop up the centers. Cook the celery and parsley in the lard for a few minutes, then add the ground cooked meat, bread crumbs, onion centers and seasoning. Fill the onion shells with this stuffing, and bake.

Best Returns
Greatest returns from a small plot of ground come from fresh greens such as spinach, chard, kale and leaf lettuce, and from beets and carrots. As soon as one early crop has been harvested, the ground can be refitted for a late planting.
