Intense Cold Near Equator

At an altitude of 11 miles above the equator the night temperature frequently falls to 112 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit. Above that it gets warmer rather than colder.

Scap. Cleaning

Walls and woodwork can be improved by a soap and water cleaning that any homemaker can give them. Make a thin soap jelly from the left-over soap scraps by melting the scraps in about ten parts of water to one part soap. Dilute the jelly with some warm water if still too thick, and apply it to painted walls and woodwork with a sponge or soft cloth. Rinse thoroughly with cloths wrung out in cool clear water and wipe dry. Start at the bottom of a wall and work up, always overlapping a little to avoid streaks.

Fanish Fruit Stains

If material on which you find a fruit stain is washable, stretch it over a large bowl and pour boiling water through the fruit or berry stain. If the stain is stubborn, on white or cotton, bleach with hydrogen peroxide or chlorine bleach. With non-washable fabrics, use a 10 per cent solution of acetic acid to sponge colored materials. Materials where color will not be affected may be sponged with warm water, then hydrogen peroxide.

State Flowers

The movement to choose state flowers began in 1890 in New York, strangely enough, since its legislature to this day has not designated a state flower. New York school children cheer the goldenrod and later the rose. Oklahoma, in January, 1903, was the first state to take official action and picked the mistletoe as its emblem for display at the Chicago World Fair. Minnesota followed a month later with the lady slipper or moccasin flower.

Can Serve Offense

Many gardeners find that by growing two or more greens, of varying flavor, they are able to serve them oftener, and thus improve the family vitamin intake. But when this is done, not so much of either should be sown, since quality is lost when these crops are not harvested regularly. In fact, it will pay to keep the plants cut back, even if the leaves have to be fed to the chickens.

In 1924, a law was passed providing that all non-citizen Indians born within the territorial limits of the United States were thereby declared citizens of the United States.
