City Mail Delivery May Be Discontinued Unless Repairs Made

A warning was issued yesterday by N. J. Nelson, postmaster that city delivery of mail will be discontinued after October 9th inspection in city areas hazardous to city carriers. Delivery of mail will be discontinued to houses where sidewalks are in need of repair; this applies to walks from streets to houses. Also where weeds, briars and tall grass hang over the sidewalk. Trees must be trimmed so that no limb hangs lower than seven feet.

Not only will patrons who have not complied with this request have mail delivery discontinued, but patrons living beyond such property where owner does not comply will suffer the same fate.

Patrons are urged to have needed improvements made before route inspection, October 9th. The post office department claims the distinction that the mail must go through regardless of the weather, but forbids carriers to deliver mail where sidewalks are not kept in repair and clear of overhanging brush.

NEW EGG PRICING SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

A simplified pricing schedule on eggs and egg products, effective September 25 (revised MPR 333), was announced by W. H. McCargar, district OPA food price specialist, replacing a more intricate pricing system, currently in effect, of basing point cities and freight rates.

"Any handler of shell eggs in any town can instantly find his selling price for any type of sale now merely by looking at the ceiling prices in the regulation listed for his county," McCargar explained.

At retail, egg prices are determined by percentage mark-ups according to group classification of store, he pointed out.

Highest ceiling prices for eggs for the week beginning September 28 in all Oregon counties except Malheur and Harney were announced as follows:

Grade A Extra Large, 71c per dozen; Grade A Large, 69c; Grade A Medium, 63c; Grade A Small, 53c. For eggs sold loose and not in cartons, the price is 2c a dozen less for each grade.

For eggs sold in Harney and Malheur counties: Grade A Extra Large, 70c per dozen; Grade A Large, 68c; Grade A Medium, 62c; and Grade A Small, 53c per dozen, with 2c loss per dozen for eggs sold loose and not in cartons.

BICYCLE RATIONING ENDED

Rationing of bicycles was ended today, Frederic F. Janney, district OPA rationing executive, revealed Saturday.

"This action was taken," Janney said, "because so few bicycles are on hand, and so few scheduled for production that rationing now serves little useful purpose."

Bicycle dealers are required to hold all records of rationing sales, and inventories, for six months, Janney emphasized.
