

Groups Join in Effort to Help The State Banks

Organized labor and the Oregon State Grange have joined the Oregon Bankers Association, Portland Chamber of Commerce and numerous civic groups in supporting the constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters on November 7th which would remove the dual liability for stockholders of state banks. J. B. Booth, Chairman of the Committee supporting the plan, announces, "The proposed amendment," said Mr. Booth, "makes it possible for Oregon state banks to enjoy the same opportunity to improve the capital structure that is now afforded the banks of forty-five other states in the union."

"The present state law enacted at the behest of Oregon state banks at a time when the same requirement was made of national banks and was for the purpose of bringing our state banks in line with the federal program."

Since the enactment of the Federal Deposit Insurance plan available to both national and state banks, the dual liability feature has been removed by law from the national banks. Forty-five other states have removed it from their state banks. The law as it is submitted to the Oregon voters, provides that state banks can eliminate the dual liability feature, when and if they provide Federal Deposit Insurance. In other words, only state banks as have the Federal Deposit Insurance which protects deposits up to \$5,000 will enjoy the right of removing the dual liability feature.

COTTON GOODS WILL BE "TIGHT"

The supply of cotton goods is "tighter now than it has been any time during the war and is expected to remain 'tight' for from one to two years after the collapse of Germany, the Office of War Information and the Foreign Economic Administration reports, on the basis of facts supplied by the War Production Board and the Foreign Economic Administration. Production is insufficient to meet military and civilian demands, and the market is short in basic types of cotton fabrics used in low-cost garments. The Pacific war will require more cotton as the basic military clothing staple, whereas wool has been heavily used in Europe. Cotton fabrics such as certain denims and chambrays will continue to be needed by the military, and cotton duck is now on the urgent list. During the first six months after the fall of Germany the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration is expected to ask for 300 million yards of cotton textiles, and the Food Industry must depend upon cotton bagging due to a shortage of Jute from India.

BITS O' BUSINESS

Automobile prices won't make the postwar buyer happy according to M. E. Coyle, vice-president of General Motors corporation. Pointing out that labor rates paid by the industry must be passed on to the consumer, he says the industry has no objection to high wages except that they increase the selling price of products, thereby restricting sales. Marketing experts advise distributors to make a special study of the small town market for postwar sales. Towns with less than 25,000 population and unincorporated rural areas comprise 60 per cent of America's population.

FUEL SAVING BULLETIN AVAILABLE FREE AT OSC

Copies of the bulletin, "Saving Fuel in Oregon Homes," published by the engineering experiment station at Oregon State college when fuel supplies were first affected by the war, are still available and will be sent free to any Oregon citizen requesting them, says S. H. Graf, director of the station.

This bulletin, written by Earl C. Willey, assistant professor of mechanical engineering, includes instructions and easily understood sketches to help home owners improve the efficiency of any type of heating system. One section is devoted to reducing heat losses through insulation and weather

stripping, either in old houses or in new construction. New Oregon residents from coal-burning regions will probably be most interested in a discussion of different kinds of Oregon fuel wood from the standpoint of the consumer. Contrary to general belief, bark of Douglas fir wood has the highest heating value, with the heart wood next, and sap the lowest.

Prevent Erosion

Forests build up a thick layer of decayed leaves, twigs, etc., under which there is a dense mat of fine roots anchoring trees, shrubs, and herbs. The rain first saturates the crown foliage, then the understory foliage, and finally the thick mat of humus. All this retards runoff so that erosion is inhibited and a steady supply of clear, filtered water is fed into the forest streams. Forest trees consume huge quantities of water through the roots. This also reduces the amount of water which would otherwise run off too quickly.
