SCHOOL CARNIVAL TIME AGAIN

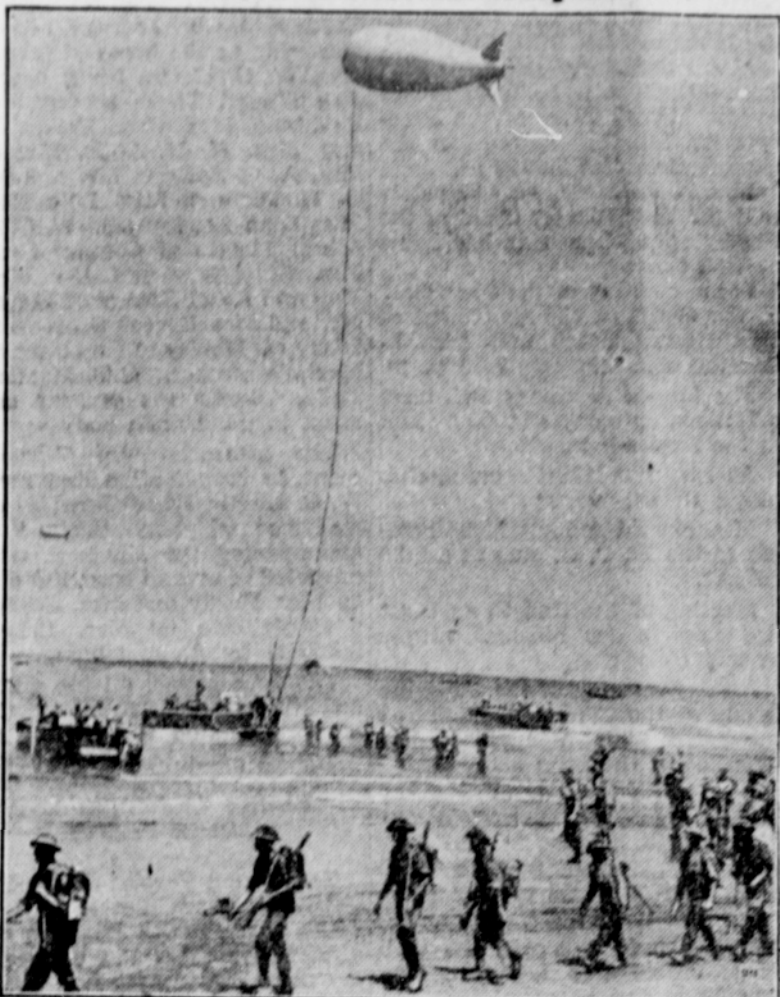

Richfield Oil Co. New Refinery Is Dedicated October 5

With the dedication October 5 of Richfield's new refinery expansion near Los Angeles, California, additional high-powered fuel is being provided for the gigantic engine of war which is steadily rolling up victory after victory in the Pacific conflict with Japan.

Until the emergency is over, this super-fuel will be available only for our war planes, but, with the coming of peace, its unusual quick-starting, high power and steady cruising qualities will be adapted for use in marine and automobile motors. Much better diesel and lubricating oils will also be provided through the new refining processes which produce this super fuel.

The oil industry has not only been thinking and working along lines that keep abreast of the latest in motor design, but it is even prepared for radical improvements in the motor of the future.

PROBABLE OREGON VOTE ON NOV. 7 PUT AT 450,000

SALEM—About 450,000 votes will be cast in Oregon's general election November 7, the state elections division estimated Monday.

Total registration, which closed Saturday, was estimated at 600,000, compared with 613,248 for the 1940 presidential election. Approximately 75 per cent of registered voters cast their ballots in presidential elections in Oregon.

The elections division estimated that 10 per cent of the 450,000 votes would be cast by service men.

AID FOR WAR VICTIMS

Since Poland was invaded in 1939, Americans have given more than \$175,000,000 to war victims of more than 20 countries, the President's War Relief Control Board reported in calling attention to the second National War Funds Drive to be conducted during October. Before the War Relief Control Board was established, 700 agencies were appealing to the public separately for support. Now only 110 agencies are authorized to engage in foreign and domestic war charity—including United Service Organizations, United Seamen Service, War Prisoners Aid, and local Community Chest Services. The \$250,000,000 fund sought this year is expected to bring aid to 60 million persons.
