Explorer Scout Program Revised

After more than a year of research and study, a complete revision of the "explorer" program of the Boy Scouts of America as a part of senior Scouting was announced yesterday by J. R. Bruckhart, president of the Oregon Trail Council.

The revised program for boys over 15 years of age was hailed by local scout leaders as "a step forward" in offering advanced scouting in the wilderness and a definite program of advancement for young men interested in following the lore of the pioneer.

"Explorer scouting now takes its place as a specialized program equivalent to the companion senior programs of the sea and air," G. E. Gaylord, commissioner for senior scouting, said. "Its traditions and its skills have as romantic a background as do the traditions and skills of the sea and air."

Gaylord also said that "explorer scouting is the modern version of the finest American tradition of the spirit of the out-of-doors that made America ours. It is the counterpart of the work of the men who build America—our explorers, woodsmen, pioneers, and rangers. It is keeping alive those attributes that have made America great."

The new program, represents a complete revision of the explorer scout program which was first introduced in April 1933 as a specialized program for senior scouts, K. A. Wells, scout executive said in commenting on the importance of the changes. He explained that more explorer scouts, under the new plan, will have their own uniforms and that new insignia is being designed to be available this fall.

Walter H. Banks, chairman of the Oregon Trail council advancement committee, praised the fact that the new explorer program provides definite requirements for advancement in ranks. "Under the new program," he explained, "when a boy decides to participate in explorer scouting, he first becomes an explorer apprentice. Then by meeting requirements which cover physical fitness, campcraft, field craft, expeditions, life explorations, community participation, and group participation, he may receive the ranks of explorer woodsman, explorer frontiersman, and explorer ranger."

Gaylord, who will supervise the new program as commissioner for senior scouting, explained that officers of an "explorer post" will include an explorer guide, who is a

young man leader elected by the explorers, and a post advisor, who is the adult leader. To carry out the democratic operation of the post, Gaylord said, there are four committees covering outdoor programs, indoor meetings, social activities, and service, and the committee will work much as do those in a modern service club.

This is Fire Prevention Week, by proclamation of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. One out of every three persons who lost their lives as a result of fires in the United States last year was a farm person, the Department of Agriculture reports. Fire is more hazardous on the farm than in the city because few farms can call on a trained fire department for assistance, most farms are not equipped with a ready water supply for fire-fighting, farm buildings usually are not as fire resistant as city buildings and farmers usually

carry less fire insurance than city people do. Farm fire prevention suggestions have a readily available ladder that will reach to the top of the highest building, see that there is a water supply for fire fighting in the farm yard, and establish firebreaks around haystacks, farm buildings and mat-

uring farm crops of high fire hazard.
