Hurd, Wheeler, Holland, 1930-40-41-42-43	\$763,104.03

In the above years my Court expended in General Fund and Road Funds an average of \$255,812.48 per year less than has Judge Hurd's court.

While County Judge from January 1, 1933 to April 1, 1938, my Court took Lane County out of debt and put the County on a cash basis and kept it there during the depression.
