SHRINKING FRONTIERS

Announcement from Portland recently that there is a possibility that America's big farms would be cut up for returning veterans is significant and might offer a solution to one of the growing national difficulties. Thousands of smaller farmers have been replaced in the past ten years by the expanding farm movement which has been brought about by the use of modern farm machinery. These farmers, who provided a substantial payroll to the community in which they lived have in most instances moved to the city to make the labor problem more difficult.

There are no more frontiers in America so far as land is concerned and the proposal to settle the farm minded returning veterans on the land the government has acquired may not be the answer to the fact that farms like factories are tending to grow bigger. If not then there is an economic problem to be solved, regardless of which party wins. There may be new frontiers to conquer, but we must also face the possibility of making a social adjustment so far as rural America is concerned. We believe our way of life is deeply rooted in rural America and that despite the fact the drift of population is toward the cities, the smaller towns and rural America must be stabilized if we are to avoid difficult times like those faced in 1933.

SCIENCE JOINS THE FIGHT

Fire prevention week is past, but during those seven days of concentrated battle against fire the public learned of new weapons to combat uncontrolled fire. Among those weapons are such innocuous sounding devices as fog, foam and snow. One story told how a munitions ship collided with a tanker off the East Coast a few months ago. The crash exploded and sank the munitions ship and turned the tanker into a raging inferno. By all the rules, the tanker should have been a total loss. It wasn't.

Twelve hours after the accident, navy fire fighters arrived with some of the latest fire fighting tools. By then the heat was unbelievable. Bronze fittings melted like hot chocolate. Ahead of the Navy men as they went aboard the ship, traveled a ball of hissing fog. Sheltered behind it, they advanced toward the ship's stern. Arrived at the stern cargo tanks, they applied another modern fire fighting miracle: foam. From special nozzles they shot a smother of snowy bubbles which stuck on everything. The bubbles piled up in the tanks, floating on the burning gasoline like super-yeasty dough, choking out the fire. A \$3,500,000 ship and 70,000 barrels of war fuel had been saved.

The mysterious fog that saved that ship was made by dozens of needle-fine streams of water rushing from a hose at 100 miles an hour. Backed by 150 pounds of pressure, these streams, aimed to shatter against each other, broke up every gallon of water into 23,000,000,000 particles—literally a drenching, cooling fog.
