Firacres Youth Killed in Accident

Floyd E. Jones, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elry Jones of Fir Acres, route 2, Eugene, died Friday afternoon of a gunshot wound from his own 12-gauge, single-barrel shotgun, in an accident while hunting ducks in sloughs near his home. With his companion, 13-year-old Leo Mollier, he was crossing a log over a slough, Mollier preceding him. Mollier said he heard the discharge of the gun which Jones was carrying, and looked around, to see the older boy fall off the log. Jones told the Mollier lad to run for help, and he started running to a neighbor's house to put in a call for an ambulance. Jones had died of hemorrhage before they returned.
