Red Cross Worker Speaks
 Mrs. Kenneth Moore, Red Cross worker of Eugene, spoke to the girls' league November 22 in a special assembly.

Mrs. Moore stated that 68 countries had the Junior Red Cross before the war and that it functioned both in peacetime and in wartime.

Mrs. Moore asked if the girls' league would be interested in Red Cross projects. The membership fee is one cent and any money over that goes into the Lane County service fund. All that is left over from the Junior Red Cross goes into the National Children's fund.

The Junior Red Cross also supplies cards to camps and hospitals so that they might send them home. Stuffed animals can be made from scraps and be sent to the British children.

There is a need for children's clothing but there is no need for shoes. Mrs. Moore said that these clothes should be good outgrown clothes and not clothes ready to be thrown away.

The veterans of the American Legion are asking for gift boxes by December 10. She also showed things that boys could make such as games, puzzles, ash trays, writing boards, lap boards and lap trays.

The girls voted to carry on a project of knitting squares for an afghan. In conclusion Mrs. Moore stated that she would leave yarn for the afghan and would like to see this school enrolled in the Junior Red Cross.
