Jeep Mill Uses The Forest Waste

At Creswell, an experiment is underway which may well prove of great economic value to the forest industry of this state. Ferrell Brown and Nels Ohrling, owners of the Pacific Mill Company, have started a re-logging venture on 1,800 acres of newly logged land.

With a two-man logging crew they are recovering with light gear and equipment, small stuff left in the first time over, because it was not economically possible to handle with large crews and heavy equipment. As much as 10 thousand feet of logs per acre has been salvaged in this experiment. Seldom is the recovery less than 6 thousand feet per acre.

The recovered logs average 28 feet long, and 10-11 inches in diameter. Recovery from the first landing of 30 acres was 300 thousand feet. Logs are hauled 7 miles to a jeep-sized sawmill at Creswell, operated by four men. Cost of logs in pond at Creswell is less than \$14 per thousand. Recovery at the mill from these logs knocked down in the course of logging the larger timber, and from broken logs also recovered, runs but one grade less than the larger logs handled in the company's larger mill. Daily cut at jeep mill is 15-18 thousand.

Saving in road construction, felling of timber and stumpage prices make this re-logging idea very attractive, says Nels Ohrling, who believes that this plan offers an opportunity to recover much of the material formerly considered uneconomical, which was left in the woods because it was too costly to remove.

Keep your eye on the jeep sawmill after the war. Here is a post-war opportunity for returning servicemen to get into business without much capital. Re-logging logging firms' lands with light equipment and small crews.

City Officials Will Attend Municipal Post-War Session

Eugene, December 11.—City officials of Cottage Grove have received invitations to attend a meeting of all city officials of this region, and of civic leaders interested in municipal postwar programs. The meeting, which will be held in Eugene on Thursday evening, December 14, is the last of a series of 22 regional meetings sponsored by the League of Oregon Cities being held throughout the state this fall.

Featured topics on the program will be a discussion of proposed federal and state legislation of particular interest to cities, postwar planning, and the exchange of information on local municipal programs.

Meeting with local officials of the county will be Fred C. Inkster, president of the League; Fred Peterson, commissioner of public affairs of Portland; Herman Kehrl, executive secretary of the League and director of the Bureau of Municipal Research and Service at the University of Oregon.

Elisha Large of Eugene has made the arrangements.

1944 Farm Roles May Be Reduced

The possibility of a reduction in rates of payment for practices performed under the 1944 agricultural conservation program was called to the attention of Lane county farmers in a statement released today by Geo. W. Platt, chairman of the County AAA Committee.

Word has been received from the State AAA Committee that, on the basis of county estimates of practices performed, total payments earned by Oregon farmers may exceed the State's allocation of funds for conservation and soil building practice work.

Oregon was granted an allocation of \$2,617,000 from the \$300,000,000 appropriated by Congress for the 1944 practice program. To obtain the fullest use of this allocation, in terms of improvements to the State's agricultural resources, farm allowance provisions of previous programs limiting the amount of each farm's payment were not included in the 1944 program.

Because of the marked increase in practices carried out by farmers and ranchers, it now appears that total payments earned will be in excess of the allocation. Unless additional funds are allocated, a uniform percentage reduction in all payments will be necessary. This is in accordance with the policy of sharing available funds with all cooperators, rather than paying on a "first come, first served" basis until funds are exhausted.

Lane County Herds List in Diversification

Lane county produces 72 farm commodities according to L. R. Briethaupt, extension agriculture economist and Mrs. Elvera Horrell, junior extension statistician. This county has the greatest diversity of farm crops in the state.

Milk production ranked first as Lane County's principal agricultural product. Following were chicken eggs in second place, cattle and calves third; turkeys, fourth; and farm forest products, fifth. Others in the seventy-five per cent grouping in estimated order of importance were greenhouse products; truck crops; hogs; sheep, lambs, and wool; chickens; oats; and wheat.

Commodities produced in Lane county that accounted for the remaining 25 per cent of the average value of farm marketings, listed in approximate order of importance, follow: hops; cherries; hay; filberts; common rye grass.

NEW SPRAYS SUBJECT OF HORT MEET DISCUSSION

The first report in Oregon on tests of DDT with tree fruits will be made at the fifty-ninth annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural society at Hood River December 8 and 9.

The detailed program just released by J. B. Smullin, Jr., Parkdale, president, and O. T. McWhorter, Corvallis, secretary-treasurer, lists Leroy Childs, superintendent of the Hood River branch station as a speaker on experiences with DDT and other new spray material, including tar oil sprays.

President A. L. Strand of O. S. C. is scheduled to address the opening session on sidelights on agricultural research in Oregon. Other speakers will discuss Oregon's horticultural future, farm labor, pear pruning and thinning, the export market outlook, and other topics.

To Be Erected By The American Legion

GIVES \$14,000 TO LEGION POST TO BUY A HOME

"The least we can do is to provide a place to which those boys who are now making it possible for us to live in a free country will be proud to return," said Frank Gruber, former mayor of Norwich, N. Y., as he handed a check for \$14,000 to M. H. Newcomb, commander of Lieut. Warren H. Eaton, D. S. C., Post, American Legion, one evening in mid July.

The check represents the purchase price of a new home for the Legion post. "I'm glad to do this for you men who fought for us in 1918 and for your sons and the other men who are fighting for us now," Mr. Gruber said. "I was too old to fight in the last war, but I'm standing by to give you all the help I can in making this new Legion home the success that I am sure it will be."

The Legion post took possession of the new property on August 1 and will immediately start the work of remodeling the place to fit the purpose of a club and meeting place. Charles Pfanz has been named president of the Lieut. Warren H. Eaton, D. S. C., Post Memorial Corporation, which will be in charge of opening and operating the home.
