## 399th Infantry Sees Quick Action

**SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE-** The 399th Infantry Regiment of the 100th (Century) Division set some kind of record for the speed with which it said goodbye to the East River and hello to the Rhine.

Some of the men in the regiment marched down Fifth Avenue in New York City to help inaugurate the 5th War Bond Drive, and they were in action on the U. S. 7th Army front in Eastern France when they read about the results of the same drive.

Arriving in France on October 20, the men, commanded by Col. Andrew W. Tychson of Middletown, N. J., spent several days assembling their equipment and regaining their land legs.

Then came the order to move up, and for three days and nights the regiment rolled toward the front. The men dismounted from their vehicles one night—and the next morning they were in the lines. They had relieved a veteran regiment that had seen service in Sicily, Italy, Anzio and Southern France, and they took over a sector that was one of the toughest along the entire front.

Cpl. Perry J. Bradford of Cottage Grove was one of the members of the 399th to see action.

## USE OF IODIZED SALT IN GOITRE PREVENTION URGED

If all table salt were iodized, as recommended by the American Public Health association, there would be no goitre problem, in the opinion of many nutrition and health authorities, reports Dean Ava B. Milam, head of the Oregon nutrition committee. The nutrition committees have been asked to direct attention of the public again to the value of iodized salt in the prevention of endemic goiter.

The use of iodized salt is particularly valuable in Oregon, as repeated scientific reports have shown that this is an iodine-deficient area, Dean Milam adds. The small daily requirement of iodine is easily met by the regular use of iodized salt. Its use is especially important in adolescence and pregnancy, she says.

Some confusion has been reported regarding the use of iodized salt in cooking and canning. When used in canning certain vegetables iodized salt will sometimes cause the liquid or juice to become somewhat clouded, which, while doing no harm, does affect the appearance of the canned product. Aside from this there is no reason why iodized salt cannot be used as well as the plain salt in all forms of cooking.

Either iodized salt of other forms of supplemental iodine are used as a regular practice in livestock production in Oregon.
