

Home Repairing Recommended for Scarce Handbags

Many items ranging from clear nail polish to sandpaper and shoe cream can be used these days to keep good but worn handbags looking presentable, says Miss Lucy Lane, extension specialist in clothing and textiles at O. S. C. New leather bags are scarce and all kinds are expensive compared with prewar prices. The following suggestions for cleaning and mending are offered by Miss Lane.

Clean fabric bags with dry-cleaning fluid, but do not use this fluid on leather because it removes natural oils and may make leather crack. Shiny spots on suede can often be removed by rubbing with fine sandpaper. Matching shoe dye or India ink will help retouch scratched and worn corners on leather. To hide water spots and other stains on leather, use a colored shoe cream, or a wax polish.

Use silver polish to shine metal trimmings or to remove gold plating that has started to wear. A protective coating of clear, colorless nail polish will keep metal finish bright, but because it rubs off, it must be renewed occasionally.

If a leather or fabric purse is stitched outside, worn places at outside seams can be neatly repaired. Rip the seam with a razor blade; fold worn places in, taking a deeper seam, and restitch. Stitching on purses usually must be done by hand. Backstitching with buttonhole twist, heavy-duty, or linen thread makes heavy seams. Waxing the thread makes it pull through more easily. It is best not to attempt outside repairs on a purse seamed inside and clamped into a frame, suggests Miss Lane.

If a zipper has broken and the slide has pulled off, hold the teeth together and slip the slide on again at the bottom. A slide that pulls off at the top can only be put on again at the bottom. To do this, remove the bottom stop, hold the teeth together, and coax slide on. Replace stop by stitching firmly across the end by hand.

A leather bag that has become limp may need nothing more than new cardboard stiffening between the lining and the leather. Cardboard that is tough and does not break easily is satisfactory.

Dairy Subsidy Payments Are Near Four Million in a Year

Salaries of State Officers May Be Upped by Bill

SALEM — Bills to give state elective officials salary increases of 13 to 50 per cent adding 22,000 to the state's annual payroll, are before the house administration and reorganization committee, the committee disclosed yesterday.

The increases range from \$1,000 a year for each of the several state supreme court justices, to \$4,500 for the governor. The lowest salary would be \$6,000 a year.

The present and proposed salaries follow: Governor, \$7,500 to \$12,000; secretary of state, \$5,400 to \$8,500; treasurer, \$5,400 to \$8,500; attorney general, \$5,000 to \$7,500; supreme court justices, \$7,500 to \$8,500; superintendent of public instruction, \$4,000 to \$6,000; labor commissioner, \$4,000 to \$6,000.

The amounts probably will be revised, and they would have to be approved by the ways and means committee, which said today it is extremely short of appropriate funds.

The house passed and sent to the senate its first bills yesterday. One appropriates \$100,000 for legislative expenses, and the other legalizes the action of the state department in issuing windshield stickers in place of motor vehicle license plates.

About half the total walnut, pecan, almond and filbert crop is marketed in the shell. The remainder goes into candies, baked goods and sundries.

During the one-year period that the dairy feed program has been in effect, nearly four million dollars in dairy production payments have been distributed to the state's farmers and dairymen through the county AAA committees, R. B. Taylor, state chairman reports.

Payments are being made now for the months of September and October, at the rates of 70 cents a hundredweight for whole milk and 10 cents a pound for butterfat. Producers are asked to submit their evidence on sales as soon as possible, with December 31 the closing date for filing September-October applications.

From October 1, 1943, through August 31, 1944, Oregon dairy producers received a total of \$3,831,212 on 702,558,800 pounds of whole milk and 8,965,242 pounds of butterfat sold. The number of producers receiving the payments averaged 16,761 per month.

Taylor points out that the dairy production payments have helped to maintain war-needed milk production by relieving the squeeze on dairy producers who were caught between rising feed costs and fixed ceiling prices for their products. As a part of the hold-the-line program, the payments have been effective in preventing an inflationary price spiral for dairy products, the chairman said.
