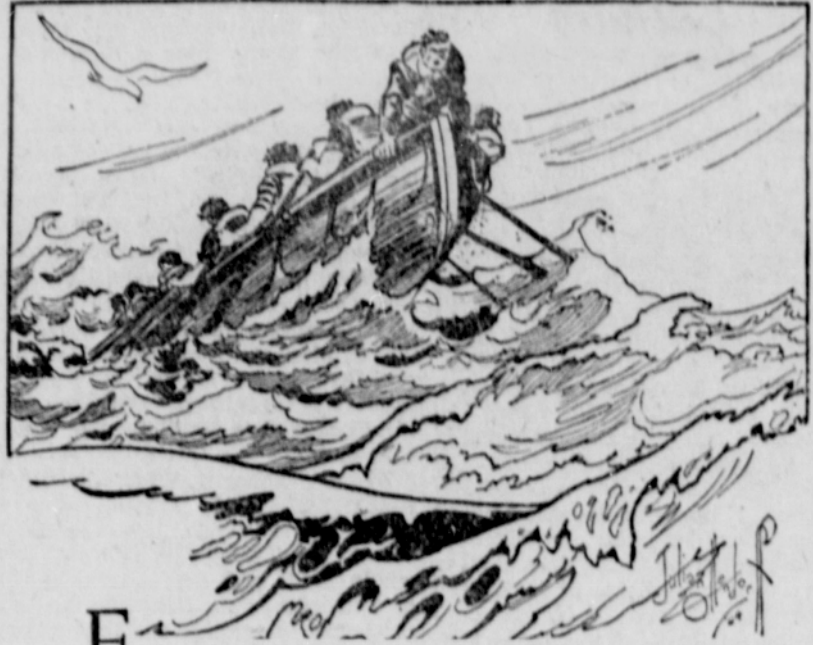

OPA PLANS NO RATIONING ON CLOTHING

WASHINGTON — OPA Administrator Chester Bowles gave assurance Wednesday night that no plans for instituting clothing rationing are in the offing.

Bowles told a news conference that the agency was not contemplating such a step despite a tight clothing situation, thereby confirming an exclusive International News Service story of January 4. He added that OPA and the war production board are working very closely together in an effort to stabilize clothing prices and expressed the hope that some reduction in clothing costs might be effected.

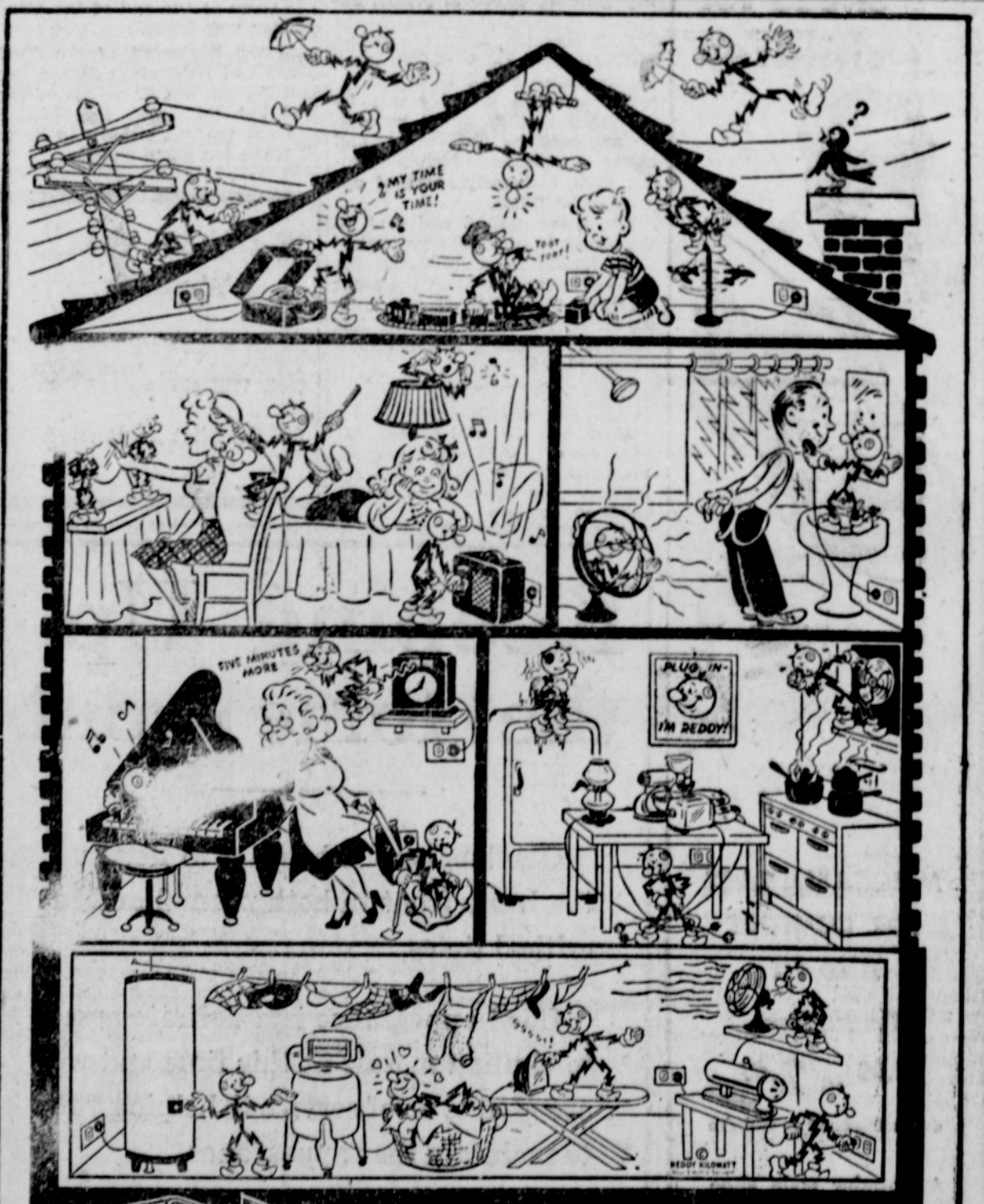
