Former Resident Victim of Spot Light Deer Hunter

Funeral services for Mrs. Chas. Duncan, a former resident, were held from the Fisher funeral home in Albany Saturday afternoon. Mrs. Duncan was the victim of a spot light deer hunter near the Snow Peak Logging Co., thirty miles east of Albany January 1st. At the time of the accident, Mrs. Duncan was said to have been washing dishes, when a shot was fired into the trailer house. The second shot from a high powered rifle struck her in the chest, passing through her body and on through the outer wall of the house. Thinking someone had gone mad, Mr. Duncan ran out of the house to investigate, returning a few minutes later to find his wife dead.

A hunter is said to have mistaken the window's reflection as the eyes of a deer and fired several shots into the house, one of which is said to have barely missed a sleeping infant of the Duncans. State police were called to investigate, but Mr. Duncan refused to prosecute the hunters. They were fined for shooting deer out of season and given a five year penitence, which was suspended after they were paroled to Mr. Duncan.

The Duncans lived here for a time when Mr. Duncan was employed by the Row River Lumber Co. A brother, Ray Henderson, living here is among the surviving relatives.

Army Nurses Are Smilingest Women

Our wounded soldiers returning to this country for hospitalization tell the same story about the U. S. Army nurses. She's probably the "smilingest" woman in the world.

In field and evacuation hospitals, Army nurses receive many thousands of men at the moment when things are darkest for the soldiers. In many cases it's the cheerful smile and the helping hand of the Army nurse that brings the wounded fighting men through.

One of the most important jobs of a nurse near the front is to help men through the first shock of their wounds. Here the judgment of the nurse plays an important part. Plasma, penicillin and other drugs are vitally important, but so is the happy smile and cheerful word of the Army nurse.

Not all nurses get a chance to work in field and evacuation hospitals. Many are doing equally important jobs in the base and general hospitals abroad and in this country.

Others serve as flight nurses on great transport planes that bring our wounded from far-off places to base and general hospitals for treatment. Still others work on board hospital ships and trains, carrying on their duties with the same skill and devotion that marks the Army nurse wherever she may be.

Right now there is an urgent need for registered nurses under 45 years of age to serve with the U. S. Army Nurse Corps. For with every victory we must inevitably have an increasing number of casualties. To apply for a commission in the Army Nurse Corps, write the Surgeon General, U. S. Army, Washington 25, D. C., or go to your nearest Red Cross Procurement Office.

About beans, macaroni, rice

LOAF	LOAF
4 cups cooked spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or rice	1/4 tsp. paprika
2 tbsps. shortening	1 cup grated American cheese
3 tbsps. flour	3 tbsps. finely chopped pimiento
1 1/2 cups milk	3/4 cup finely chopped green pepper
1 tsp. salt	3 eggs
1/2 tsp. pepper	

Make white sauce: melt shortening, blend in flour, add milk gradually and cook until thick, about 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Add seasonings, cheese, pimiento and green pepper; cook 5 minutes; add spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or rice. Add well beaten eggs and pour into well-greased loaf pan or ring mold. Bake in pan of hot water in moderate oven (350° F.) 45 minutes or until set; unmold. Serves 6.

BEAN CHILI

3 medium-size onions	3 bay leaves
1 bud garlic	1 tsp. salt
1 1/2 lbs. ground beef	3 cups cooked tomatoes
3 tbsps. oil or shortening	3 cups water
2 to 3 tbsps. chili powder	2 cups dried pink beans

Chop onions and garlic. Sauté slowly with meat in hot oil or shortening in large heavy frying pan until meat separates, stirring constantly. Add seasonings, tomatoes strained through sieve, and water. Cook slowly 2 hours, stirring occasionally. Pick over and wash beans. Cook slowly in covered 3 to 4 qt. kettle with water to cover until tender, 2 to 3 hours. Add more water as needed to keep beans covered with liquid. Add meat mixture to beans; let stand several hours or overnight. Heat when ready to serve. Serves 8 to 10 generously.

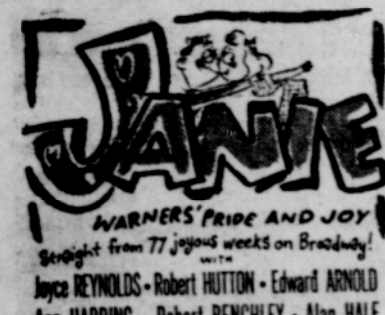

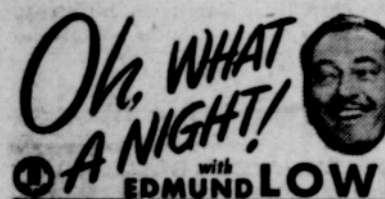
