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Council O.K.'s F. H. A. Row Type House Project

Floyd Githens, president of the Chamber of Commerce appeared before the city council at the special session Monday and asked the council's approval of an application to the federal housing administration to construct fifty housing units in Cottage Grove of the row type. Mr. Githens later explained that the Chamber of Commerce committee hoped there would be sufficient interest among local residents for the construction of at least fifteen or twenty apartments and private houses and that at the present time the outlook was promising that several local residents would take advantage of the opportunity, if approved by the federal housing administration.

The council also granted to Fred Annett, operator of the dump ground east of town, the exclusive right of collecting and hauling garbage or refuse from residents of the city limits for a period of one year. Under the terms of the contract signed by Mr. Annett, the following charges will apply over town, it being optional with the property owner to avail himself or herself of the services: In the residential district the charges will be 75 cents per month; for restaurants, not less than \$3.00 nor more than \$10.00 per month; other business establishments, not less than \$3.00 nor more than \$10.00; others for dry refuse not including garbage by agreement between parties, but not to exceed \$3.00 per month. The hours of collection of garbage or refuse will be established by the city council.

The council also recinded its earlier action in agreeing to pay fifty percent of the cost of bait to be used in the rodent control and agreed to pay all the cost of such bait, provided the total cost did not exceed \$150.00. The rodent control program will be in charge of Donald Dickey, rodent control officer of Eugene.

Lions Win Over Millers - 22 to 21

Before a capacity crowd, one of the season's closest games, the Cottage Grove Lions eked out a win, 22-21, over a strong Springfield Millers' basketball team at Springfield Friday night.

The battle was hard fought with 37 fouls during the game. Neither team was ahead more than four points at any one time.

In the first quarter Heath and H. Witherspoon of C. G. scored two points on gifters, while Lake and Barnum of the Millers were making two gifters. Aune of Springfield broke the ice after six minutes of play to score the first field goal of the game. G. Witherspoon of the Lions dropped one in a few minutes later to make the score four up at the quarter.

Play in the second quarter speeded up with H. Witherspoon and G. Witherspoon each scoring two points from out the key. Allbright scored one field goal for Springfield. Other scores by foul shots brought the score to 12 to 10. In the last few seconds of play in the second period Radmore sank a long shot from the middle of the court to tie the score at 12-12 at the half.

In the third period Heath scored two points on foul shots and sank a fielder from the side to score all of the Grove's four points in that quarter. Lake of Springfield scored three points and Aune one to keep Springfield in the lead 18-16 at the end of the third quarter.

Wilbur Heath, six-foot-four inch Lion center, went out of the game in the last quarter as did Springfield's Aune. Carpenter of the Lions sank a lay-in gringing the score to 19 all. Later in the same period he again sank a lay-in to place C. G. ahead 21-19. With but 30 seconds left in the game Radmore connected with another long one and tied the game, 21 to 21. Allbright fouled H. Witherspoon, who connected on one of his gifters just as the game ended. Score at the end of the game was 22-21 in favor of Cottage Grove.

Lake was high point for the losers with seven points and Heath for the winners with six.

Post-war Super Highways Visioned

Post-war American motorists, who want fast inter-city travel and unobstructed highways for long-distance motoring, may look forward to 40,000 miles of modern four and six-lane highways.

The public roads administration has been authorized by law to construct this new interstate highway system after the war and is now a work in cooperation with state authorities on plans and locations for the roads.

A spokesman told the United Press that the new highways will be similar to those constructed just before the war as far as surface materials are concerned. However, science has discovered in the past few years better methods of constructing durable bases for the roads.

The present plans call for a system of roads whereby traffic flow will be uninterrupted by cross streams of traffic and traffic lights. Within cities, the main highways in some places will be either elevated or depressed to avoid interference from city traffic. However, there will be means of leaving or entering the highways at appropriate intervals with merging flows of traffic.

Rent Problems to Be Referred O. P. A. Office Corvallis

"During the interim between January 1, 1945, the effective date of the federal rent regulation, and the date the Eugene Rent Control office is opened, there are bound to be questions on evictions," said Daniel D. Gage, district rent executive, Portland OPA.

"It is regrettable that at the present time we have no local staff to advise people on their eviction rights. However, the following salient factors may be pointed out. Any notice to vacate dwelling units must comply with the Federal Rent Regulations and if it does not, it is invalid. The Federal Rent Regulations do not prevent evictions but limit them to seven grounds. One of the purposes of the regulations is thus to prevent unlawful evictions which tend to circumvent the regulations."

There is also the requirement that copies of all evictions sent tenants must also be sent to the local area rent office within 24 hours. Also, it is specifically stated: "At the time of commencing any (court) action to remove or evict a tenant—the landlord shall give written notice thereof to the area rent office, stating the title of the case, the number of the case where that is possible, the court in which it is filed, the name and address of the tenant, and the ground under this section under which removal of eviction is sought."

If persons have serious eviction problems, the solution to which cannot be deferred until the area office is opened, they are advised to consult or write the Associate Rent Director, Corvallis Rent Control Office, OPA, Corvallis, Oregon. Otherwise, it would be more advisable to wait until the local rent staff may advise, when the office is opened in Eugene shortly after February 1.

New Food Stamps Are Announced

Six more red stamps will be good on January 28 for obtaining meats-fats, and five more blue stamps will be good on February 1 for buying more rationed canned goods, the Office of Price Administration announced today.

Blue stamps are validated on the first day of each calendar month.

Red stamps are validated on the first day of each rationing period. Since the February rationing period will last five weeks instead of four, beginning January 28 and ending March 3, six red stamps instead of five, given for four week ration periods, will be good on January 28, OPA said.

Red stamps that will be good that day for meats-fats, each worth 10 points—a total of 60 points—are Y5, Z5, A2, B2, C2 and D2.

Blue stamps that will be good on February 1 for processed foods each worth 10 points—a total of 50 points—are H2, J2, K2, L2 and M2, a total of 50 blue points.

Mercury Drops to 24 Above on 24th for Coldest Spell.

Up to yesterday morning this section had experienced some unusual winter weather with the five preceding days clear and cold and the wind from the north. The coldest weather of the month was reached yesterday morning at the weather station at the Cottage Grove dam with a low temperature of 24 above. Sunday morning the mercury registered 25 above, Tuesday morning 26, 26 on the 23rd and 28 on the 22nd. A low reading of 17 above was recorded at Blackbutte on the 23rd.

Since this is an all-day get-together, from 10 o'clock to 3 o'clock and those attending will find something of interest for as brief as or as long as they wish to remain, arrangements have been made for lunch, which will be served by the ladies of Four Oaks Grange under the direction of the home economics committee.

South Lane Boy Scout District Shows Big Gain

Between 200 and 225 parents, scouts, cubs and friends of scouting attended the district meeting here last night in the I. O. O. F. building which highlighted probably the most successful year in Boy scouting ever seen in the South Lane district. Starting with a potluck dinner served in the I. O. O. F. hall dining room, the meeting closed with the selection of officers for another year.

New officers were placed in nomination by Joe Crick, the Rev. Frank Brown and Damon Scott as a nominating committee. The report of the nominating committee was made unanimous by the group, which was as follows: Orlo Bagley, district chairman; Fred Blickle, vice chairman; five members of the council at large: Don Kabler, L. S. Hird, H. L. Wolfard, N. J. Nelson Jr., Damon Scott. The institutional representatives on the council chosen were: Carl Shoberg of troop 13; The Rev. George Hardy, troop 60; The Rev. Frank Brown troop 18 and E. R. Husted from cub pack 318.

H. L. Wolfard, district chairman served as toastmaster and introduced Judd Compton of Eugene, assistant area executive, who reviewed briefly the accomplishments of scouting in the South Lane district in 1944. The 1944 goal of the district according to Mr. Compton, who said he took the figures from Dist. Chairman Wolfard was 95 scouts and cubs. At the beginning of the year the district had 40 scouts and 23 leaders. The goal of 1944 was passed in October when 56 scouts, 40 cubs and 39 leaders were registered. At the end of December there were 101 boys connected with scouting or cubbing, 39 leaders, representing a gain of 153 percent in membership and 70 percent in leadership. Up for advancement during the year were: 23 second class scouts, 15 first class; 57 merit badges, 4 star scouts, 1 life scout and one eagle scout.

The past year also saw the organization of two new scout troops in Cottage Grove, Boy Scout troop 60, sponsored by the Baptist church and cubpack 318 sponsored by the Cottage Grove Lions club.

Kenneth Wells, area commissioner of Eugene in the principal address called attention to the fact that Boy scouting was only 35 years old, but the movement now represents almost 2,000,000 men and boys. Hitler in his rise to power took some of the essential organization features employed in scouting, the principal difference was that the youth movement in Germany was answerable to one man, he said and was built on the idea of racial superiority.

Cup to be Awarded Outstanding F. F. A. Boy Annually

The Chamber of Commerce has voted funds for the purchase of a cup to the outstanding FFA boy of South Lane county. Favor action on this move was voted at the regular meeting Tuesday to further agriculture interest among the young farmers of this section. The cup would be awarded annually by the high school agricultural teacher under the present plan and the name of the winner engraved on the cup. Tentative plans call for the cup to be displayed at the high school.

Chamber members also heard H. E. Eakin report on the projected housing construction here, where a committee has requested construction of additional housing units here at the earliest possible time. Dr. H. A. Hagen also reported that the city had signed a contract with Fred Annett giving Annett the exclusive right to collect garbage within the city limit.

Looking to the matter of making the proposed rodent control county wide President Floyd Githens appointed a committee of three consisting of Donald Kabler, Claude Kime and W. C. Martin to contact grange members and farmers to attempt to work out a plan that would extend the control to all surrounding rural territory in this district. Donald Dickey, rodent control officer of Eugene previously stated that rat bait would be supplied farmers at cost.
