December, January Driest in History of Local Weather Station

The past December-January were the driest in the history of the weather station at the Cottage Grove dam with the total moisture for January at only 4.36 inches, which is about 3 3/4 inches below normal. A total of .63 of an inch was added to the January rainfall the last two days of the month. Freezing temperature occurred the last week of January from the 21st to the 31st.

The mean temperature in the state for January was 32.4, a departure of -1.3 from normal. Highest temperature was 51.8. Relief from the cold spell was felt yesterday as weather instruments continued to rise and indications that warmer weather will continue for the next week.

January was the fourth month showing a deficiency in moisture. Average snowfall over the state is less than one third the amount usually measured at the end of the December-January period and the outlook has farmers and ranchers dependent on irrigation worried since streams, ponds and wells are low for this time of year.

Greatest amount of moisture in the state for January fell at Gold Beach, which totaled 9.33 and lowest moisture occurred at Nikkalo, which measured .12.

LOOKING AHEAD

One of these days our boys and girls will be coming home from the war, it is with deep regret that all will not come back to enjoy the freedom they have been fighting for; the workers from the war plants will march through the gates for the last time and again we will face our worst peace time enemy—unemployment. Especially during the transition period from war to peace time production. Surely none of us were foolish enough to believe those campaign promises of both parties and candidates of full employment for all as we had 10-12 millions before Pearl Harbor and with the speed of production since attained, it is only reasonable to expect many more. A lot of republicans are willing to wait and may we say "let nature take its course," but when a dreadful disease attacks the human system, the Dr. prescribes a number of remedies to cure the ailment if necessary. Some democrats are willing to leave all to the government and President Roosevelt. Some cities have employed eastern men to come out here and tell us how to avoid unemployment and depression, as if there was any less there, or any more brains; others have planning commissions but unless they really do act it is just another bureau. A lot of people believe if the older ones are retired, but lets don't expect any one thing to ease this problem made worse each time as we advance farther into a machine age. Some individuals think if big business isn't taxed too heavily that will be sufficient. It is going to take a combination of government, private enterprise, unselfish big business if there is such, and no doubt a good retirement program would be a big help, not the social security as we have it now and which is so widely advertised, and in many cases, less to be desired from a standpoint of food and clothing than our very inadequate dole system, not that English joke the Beverage Plan so widely advertised by the American press, which unlike most English jokes, is so thin anyone can see through it. There might even be more merit in the Townsend philosophy than many believe or are willing to admit, at least they have made our nation conscious of pension needs, but regardless of what is called, lets have a security broad enough to cover all who should come under it, and one deep enough to allow the receiver to live comfortably, to enjoy a part of the wealth they have helped to create, a security that will make them proud to live in America where little children are cared for, where those of production age are given an opportunity and where the "evening of life" may be a pleasant one.

Lt. T. Cox Awarded Bronze Star Medal

Lt. Thomas W. Cox, U. S. Marines, has just reported at Bremerton, Washington where he will have three months limited service.

Upon reporting there Lt. Cox was notified that he had been awarded the Bronze Star medal with the following citation: "For heroic achievement while serving as a platoon leader of a rifle platoon in action against the enemy on Saipan from June 15 to June 28, 1944."

On June 22 Lt. Cox's platoon was pinned down by enemy fire and suffering heavy casualties. Although wounded Lt. Cox refused to be evacuated until his unit had completed its mission of cleaning out a pocket of enemy resistance, and all other wounded men had been evacuated. His courage and coolness under fire were in keeping with the highest traditions of the U. S. Naval Service."

O & C Mining Grants May be Opened For Development

WASHINGTON.—Mining interests and the Interior department, says Frank S. Sever of Portland, Ore., are working out a method for opening the Oregon-California grant lands to mining development.

Sever succeeded Senator Guy Cordon as representative of the association of O & C land grant counties and will represent the association of Public Land Counties in connection with a bill to reimburse taxing bodies for losses sustained through federal acquisition of land.

The O & C bill to place administration of the entire tract under the O & C commission, will be reintroduced as soon as the mining section is completed, Sever told a reporter. The measure, which passed the House last session, was caught in the senate's log jam in the last few days and never reached the senate floor.

Sever said the Public Lands committee is working on the bill to provide payments in lieu of taxes and hopes to have it drafted soon.

Ralph E. Kalaher, assistant scout executive of the Oregon Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, will leave in mid-February to become scout executive of the Idaho Panhandle council at Coeur d'Alene, J. R. Bruckhart, council president, announced yesterday.

Kalaher has been assistant scout executive of the Boy Scout council which serves six counties in western Oregon for nearly two years and has been living in Marshfield.

Known to hundreds of Boy Scouts as camp director of Camp Lucky Boy, summer training camp on Blue River, Kalaher headed the summer camp program for the last two years.
